Congratulations to Mrs. Alvin Farmer on winning 1st prize for her plucked wool.

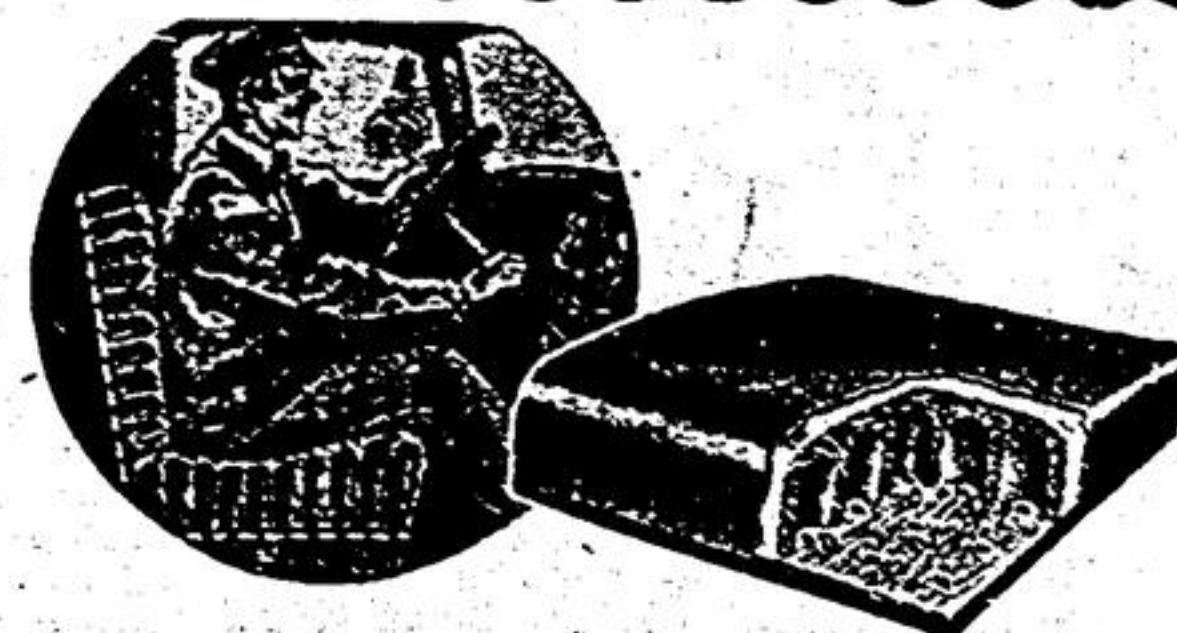
Mr. Frank Harvey was up to Parry Sound to see Charlie Milstead one day last week and he is coming along fine after being shot while hunting.
