


POLISH VETERANS WELCOMED TO CANADA:

Approximately 1,700 Polish war veterans, members of the famous British 8th army, landed at at Halifax Tuesday, Nov. 12th, and were transported across Canada by Canadian Pacific Railway for immediate placement at farm work. Top, J.S.

W. Grocholski, Toronto lawyer and president of the Canadian Polish Congress, extends a welcome to a group of the beribboned vets, many of whom were wearing the 8th army crusade patch and all who were still in uniform. They were discharged before sailing from Naples,

Italy and will soon don civilian clothes. In the lower picture the new arrivals received part of their last army pay in the embarkation area through the Canadian Pacific offices before being despatched to various Canadian army depots for disposal to Canadian farms.
