Markham village ratepayers will be asked at their election next January 1st to vote on a bylaw to spend \$30,000 or less on a town hall. Present hall is obsolete and offers very poor accommodation.

However, if the bylaw carries, the old hall may be converted into a picture theatre. Those opposed to spending \$30,000 on a new hall when a big building program for a

new school is in the offing, are opposing the bylaw also on the ground that if the present hall can be made fit for a picture theatre it can be improved for village hall use.

Advocates of the expenditure have strong hopes that the ratepayers will be found favorable to the bylaw.

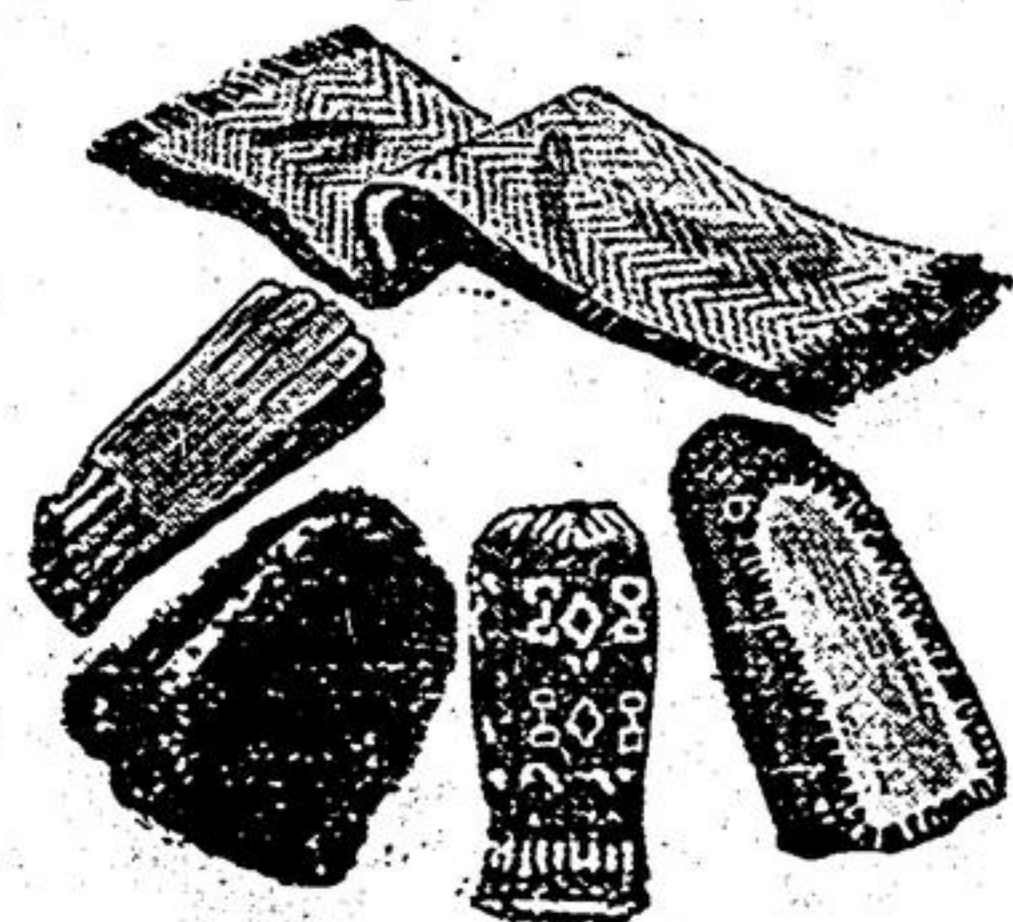
