INDIA SETTLEMENT HOPE SLIM

(Continued from Front Page) even greater danger with the other white residents of the city during the winter riots when a three-day demonstration against the British government took place.

"There was a terrific tension against the British which took a sudden anti-Christian turn during those days," he said. "A number of Government officials' houses were stormed and windows in almost all European stores were smashed. White persons who ventured out on the streets were sure to be molested. Everyone stayed inside their houses until the riot quelled. A Thoburn Memorial Church was damaged badly when a mob tried to burn it and a Catholic church in another section of the city was also damaged."

The coming of the Cabinet Mission shortly after was said by Rev. Mr. Sherk to have turned the tide and the growing difference between these two religious groups took their attention from the British.

Rev. Mr. Sherk pointed out that the vice-president of the National Council Pandit Nehru is now exercising the function of prime minister while the viceroy is leading the government in name only.

Growing power of Communists in India was also cited by the relief worker to be a stumbling block in the peaceful living of the country. "Communism is steadily gaining ground in India as industrialization grows," he stated.

Referring to the Russian attitude towards the situation Rev. Mr. Sherk stated that "there is doubt at all that Russia wants a strong hand in India."

On the whole Rev. Mr. Sherk stated he liked the people very much and would look forward to returning. Just before leaving he experienced one of the worst rains in history. Eleven inches of rain was reported to have poured down in 24 hours just as the last lap of the rainy season.

A teacher of Theology Rev. Mr. Sherk is resuming his work on the staff of the Emmanuel Bible School.

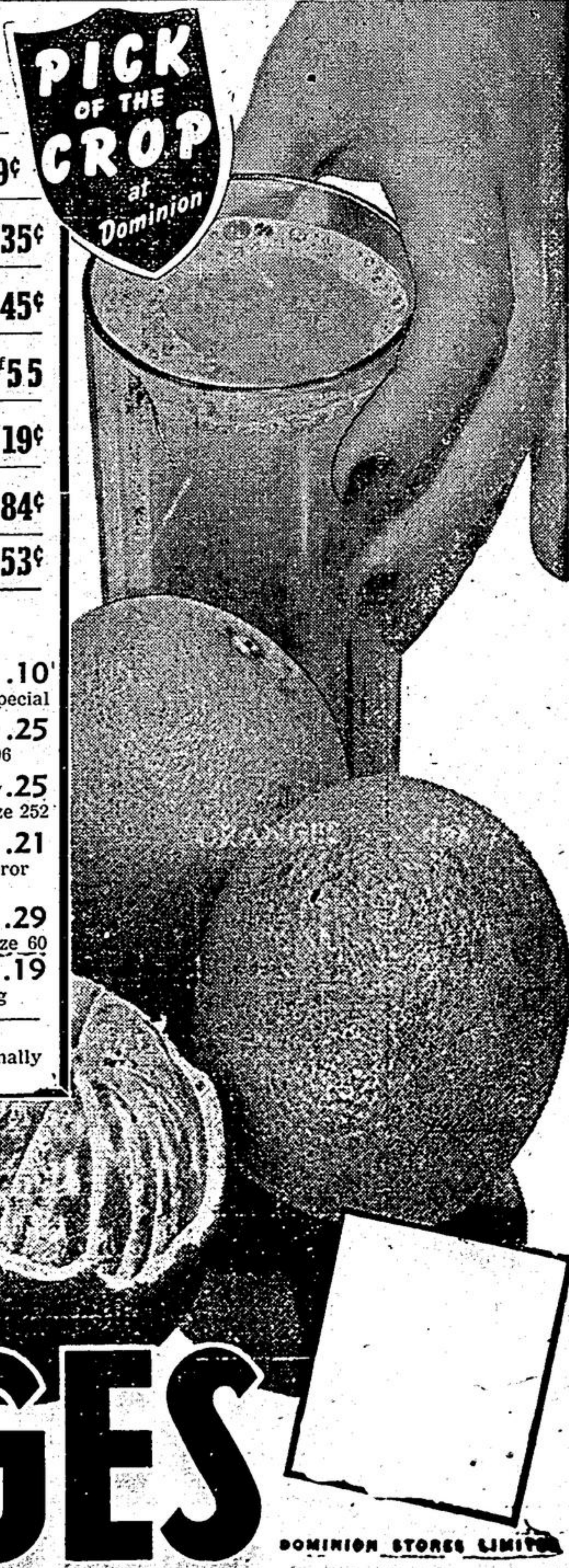
