A long list of cases is set for hearing before Mr. Justice Keiller Mac-Kay during the December sitting of the non-jury Assizes of the Supreme Court in Whitby. The hearings started on Monday and it is expected that the sitting will continue for at least two weeks, with a possibility that it might go on a few days

Undefended divorce cases are the most numerous on the list of 44 suits:to:receive judgment, there being 35 of them. Three divorce suits will be defended and there are nine civil cases to be tried.

A suit scheduled for hearing is that of William H. Leonard, 90, of Port Perry, against Dr. John H. Mc-Arthur of Blackstock for a refund on the \$1000 paid in medical fees in July 1945. A counter claim has been made against the plaintiff for an additional \$927.25, alleged to be the remainder of the fees owed the doctor for his medical attendance to the plaintiff during 1944 and 1945.

The plaintiff is asking for an accounting of the bill, which he claims was a gross overcharge. '38 Divorce Cases


