TWO WAYS TO PROGRESS

Some people have long memories. I was talking to a chap yesterday who said: "Corporation profits are far too high." What he might have said was: "Some corporation profits are too high." That would have presented an arguable point but my friend ignored the fact that in the United States, the home of big profits, there have been very sharp losses and in some years there were no net profits, that is taking industry as a whole.

I mentioned not long ago the case of the Lincoln Electric Company of Cleveland, Ohio. Mr. James F. Lincoln, the head of that Company, spoke not long ago in the City of Toronto. He has succeeded in making big profits, reducing the price of the products he sold, paying his men the highest wages of any corporation in the world. So when we make a general and sweeping statement in regard to profits we are likely to be wrong, there are many variations in our industrial picture, sweeping general statements are likely to be wrong.

Then my friend went back further than this and put forward the claim that whatever might be said of capitalism as we have it today, it was desperately hard and cruel at the time of the Industrial Revolution and in the days of the Chartist movement. Who can doubt it? Man's trail across the face of the earth has often been marked by cruelty. Yet through it all we moved upwards, seeking always for a better way.

What happened in that period? Man began to harness power to industry. The United Kingdom was a capital hungry country. The ordinary means of credit creation scarcely existed. The banking system had not reached the position it now holds. The leaders of industry might have lowered prices and thus raised slightly the standard of living. On the other hand they might use their profits for the more rapid application of new methods of production. It was only natural that they should select the latter course. They looked forward to an expanding trade, to a phenomenal increase of production. They used their profits for the expansion of industry, for the increase of employment and eventually for the betterment of conditions of the nation as a whole. The result—their country made phenomenal progress—greater than in any other country of the world. Of course, the Socialists might have tackled the job. Oh no! Socialism comes after production is well established. It takes over what others have built. It does not build from the bottom.

Nothing so inspires men to effort as the conception that they are going to build great industries which will not only bring them profit but benefit the nation as a whole. Do not laugh lightly at the last suggestion—making money is not everything in the eyes of the builders, there is the price that flows from seeing the structures rise.
