### ONTARIO APPLES PLEASE DEALERS IN GREAT BRITAIN

As the result of the arrival in Britain of a shipment of 3,000 barrels of Ontario apples, the first shipped for some years, letters are being received by the Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Thomas L. Kennedy, from merchants and dealers in Britain, expressing gratification at again being able to secure apples from this Province, and commenting very favourably on the quality and condition of the fruit on arrival. In each of the barrels shipped, a small, handsomely illustrated folder, entitled, "Ontario Apples Return to the Motherland," and asking for comments to be sent back on the condition of the apples, was placed, and the letters received are the result of this publicity effort.

The official report from the Special Products Board is also highly favorable to the apples sent from Ontario. The report covers two shipments, one of 600 barrels and the other of 2,400 barrels. It shows that one hundred per cent of the apples arrived in first, second or third class condition, which is the highest rating given. Ben Davis and Gano varieties landed in excellent condition, with Snows showing slight waste, this waste being assessed at one to three pounds per barrel. For Snow apples, which are a soft variety, this is considered a very excellent record after the long sea voyage. There were no abnormal breakages in the barrels containing the apples.
