PREMIUMS UP ON AUTOMOBILE INSURANCE HERE

Insurance companies in the Canadian Underwriters' Association and the Independent Automobile Insurance Conference are increasing their premium rates in Ontario for property damage, public liability and collision insurance except in a few areas, reports The Financial Post. Rate changes vary according to district and type of coverage. Reason is the higher number of accidents and cost of repairs. Advances range from 10% to 20%. Fire and theft insurance premiums will be reduced 10% to 15% in some areas, unchanged in others. If the government brought about compulsory insurance rates would mount still higher, since that is the record of other provinces or states with compulsory insurance.

The question as to whether preachers should discuss politics in the pulpit was recently put to cross-sections of the Canadian people in a Gallup Poll, and the result was said to be overwhelmingly against pulpit politics. The question was put thus: "Do you think clergymen should or should not discuss politics during the sermon?" The response was as follows: Should not, 75%; should, 15%; undecided 10%. It was pointed out that the majority of 15% favored the practice provided the clergy deal with public issues from the "moral standpoint," as re-

lated to the broad "problems of the day, rather than vote-catching, or party issues."

Those who were opposed to the idea are said to have reasoned that "the church was not the place for politics," or that it would make the pulpit "an organ of propaganda," or "it breaks morale and the spiritual uplift of the service." Those who favored it contended that "politics are part of everyday life," that "the clergy can stir up people to take an interest in civic affairs," and that "there should be more Christianity in politics and the clergy should point out the way for us."

Even the 75% would probably agree with this last argument, whether it be applied to politics, business, or domestic life. But politics is such a controversial subject, upon which the members of most congregations are sharply divided, and the preachers themselves, being men like the rest of us, are also of diverse opinions. Some of the clergy hold strong personal views on politics, and if every preacher were to use the pulpit as a platform for the promotion of his own political opinions, then the churches would become a political pandemonium.
