Rates of admission have been brought on a par with surrounding arenas for O.H.A. hockey this year, a move that was imperative, owing to growing expenses. Just the one item of sticks alone, is a heavy one this season, a half dozen costing as much as \$15.00.

Mrs. Harold West of Scarboro Junction, daughter of Mr. Jos. Oden formerly of Gravel Hill here, recently received a letter from a lady in Greece who had received a parcel of clothing sent through the relief channels. The letter written in the Greek language, is translated as follows:

Prositsani Province of Drama, Greece

Dear Friends and Allies,  
After complete collapse of Hitler's Germany and liberation of our little Greece from the most brutal enemy the world has ever known and the presence in our homeland of the Great British Army we again breathe the free air of a free and liberated country.

My husband was killed by the Bulgarians at the 13th kilometre of the Drama highway. Am one of five families left in a whole village. Am a mother with three children Froso (girl) age 7, and two boys, Apostolos 9, and Basil 11.

We can't find words to express our gratitude and thanks to you for your kindness on receiving of your food parcels sent to us also for your clothing. We notice your name and address on your coat pocket we received. We'll be glad if you are kind enough to answer if you have received our letter for which I enclose my address.

If we ever receive in the future anything in the way of clothing, most essential to us, will be appreciated.
