Wm. Hardy Had Death Premonition

Found in Bed in Unconscious Condition — Died Short Time Later in Oshawa Hospital

Buried in Claremont Cemetery on Friday, William Hardy, died in Oshawa Hospital in his 64th year. The service was held in the United Church here, and was attended by old friends and associates among whom he had lived most of his life. Only a couple of days previous to his death, the deceased had been visiting with a friend Thos. Pilkey, local sectionman, and had complained of not feeling too well. The late Mr. Hardy was a bachelor living alone, and Mr. Pilkey tried to prevail upon him to remain the night, but he decided to go home, asking Mr. Pilkey to look in on him the next day.

Mr. Hardy didn't appear next day, and was found unconscious in his bed, from whence he was removed to Oshawa Hospital.

The late Mr. Hardy was a mason by trade and was a Claremont resident of long standing. He is survived by three brothers, Chas. and Walter in the village and Wesley at Dunbarton.

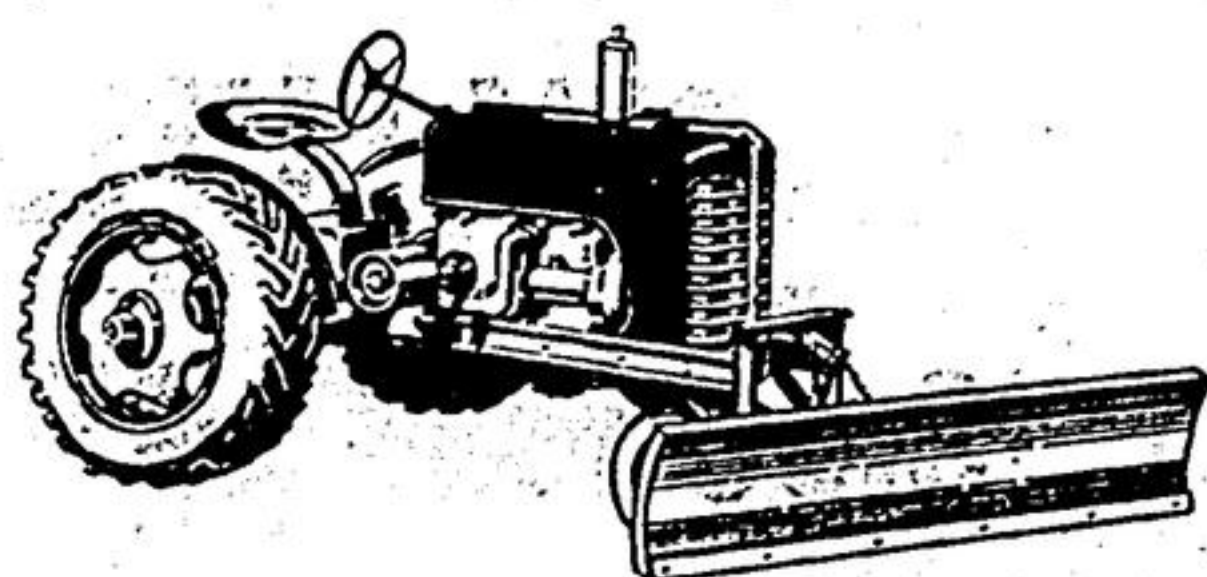
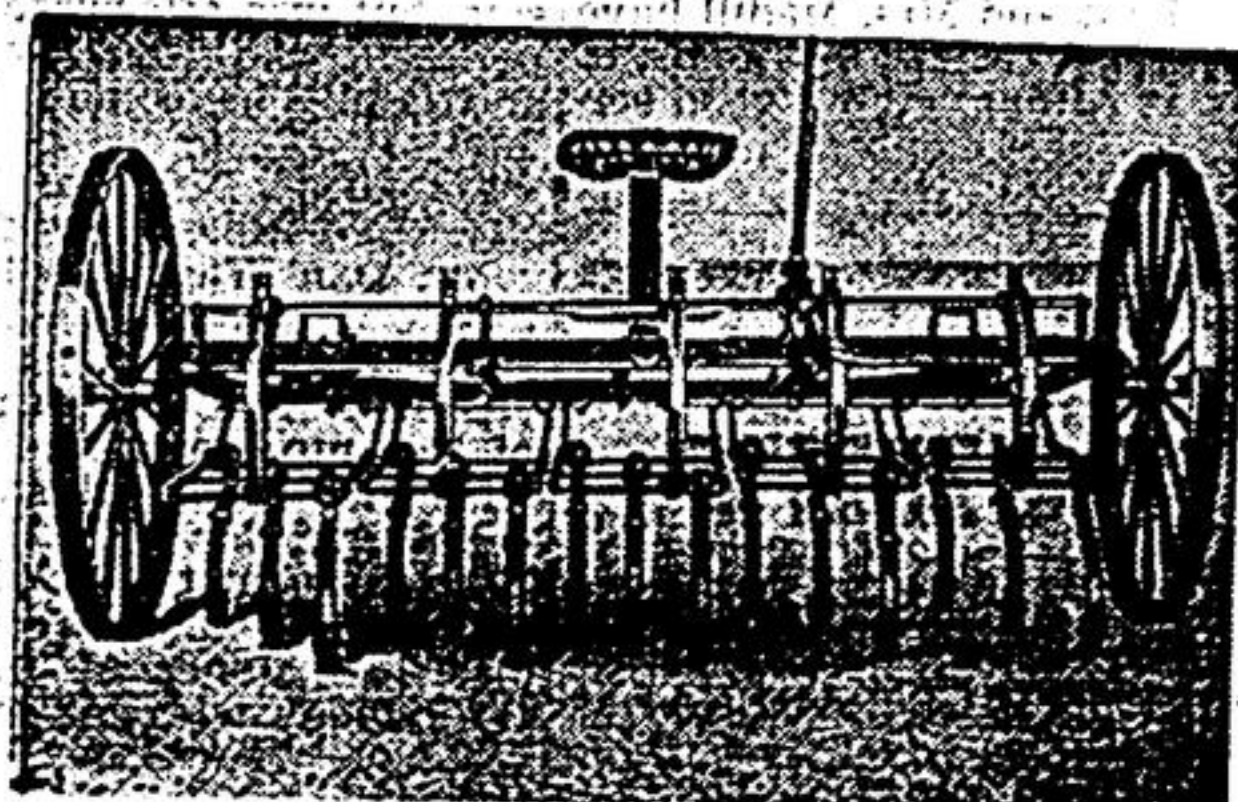
