RESTRICTIONS LIFTED ON EXPLOSIVES

An order in Council passed under authority of the War Measures Act in 1940 to regulate the sale, possession, and use of explosives was repealed on December 23rd, 1946, according to an announcement by the Hon. Allison Glen, Minister of Mines and Resources. With the repeal of this war-time regulation, Explosives Purchase Permits will no longer be required and farmers, prospectors, and contractors who formerly had to obtain permits from Police authorities may now purchase explosives without a permit.

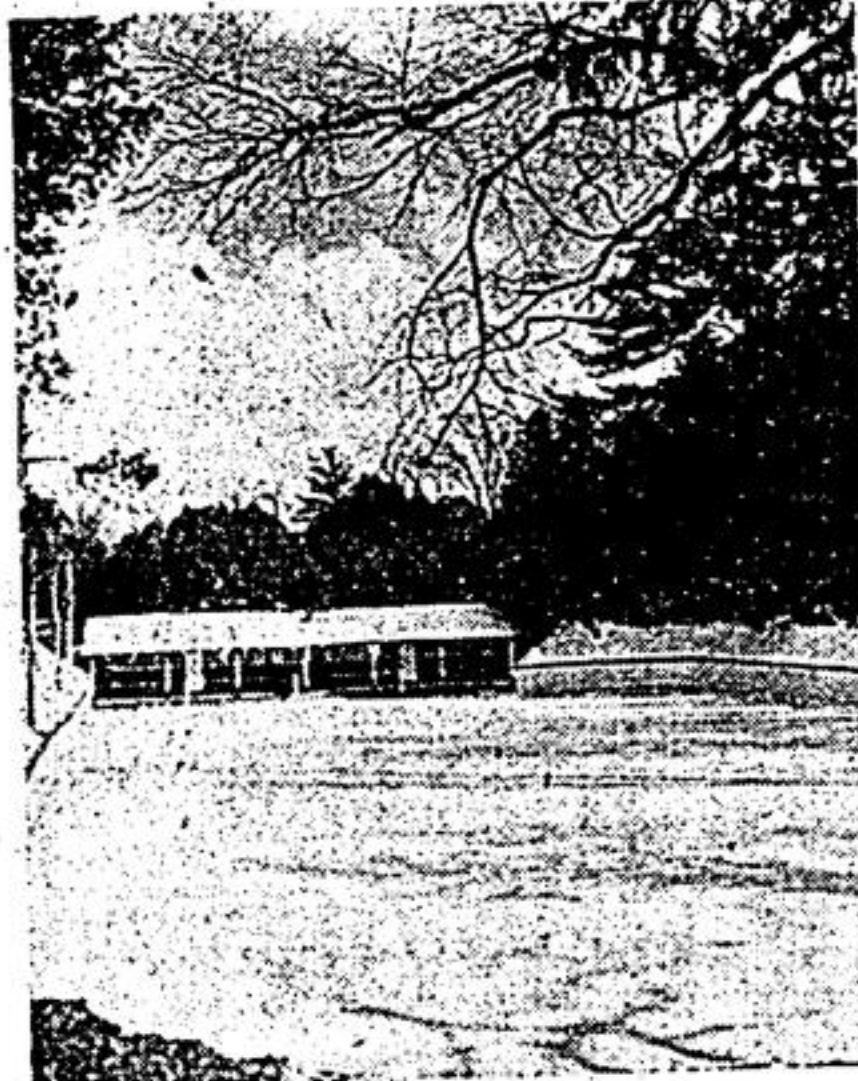
