

She's the Champion of the World



Here is Ormico Reta Roberts with her one day's, world-record production of milk—44 quarts—count 'em. The champion Holstein cow, owned by the Ontario Reformatory at

Mimico, not only set a new world record for yearly milk production — 35,207 pounds; butterfat 1,075 pounds—but also a new Canadian record for any

breed of cow. The former world record, based on a three-times-a-day milking, was 34,003 pounds, while the Canadian record was 34,636 pounds.

Native of Greenbank 89, Died at Cameron

On December 15, 1946, there passed beyond the vale to his eternal reward John Suggit, of Cameron, Ontario, near Lindsay.

Mr. Suggit was born of English parentage at Greenbank, Ontario, nearly eighty-nine years ago. His parents moved to Valentia when he was a child, and he spent the days of his youth among pioneer families of that community. In 1883 he married Ann Swain of Valentia who was a devoted wife and mother until her death in 1930. For the first three years of his married life he lived on a farm adjoining Valentia village, then moved to Cameron where the remainder of his active life was spent in farming. He was a pioneer in many new methods of farming operations, and was interested in all progressive movements in the community. Most of

all, his contribution in the form of service to the Cameron Methodist Church was felt even beyond the immediate community. He served as a class leader, a local preacher and Bible class teacher, and his sterling Christian character was a living example to all who knew him, because the principles of his religion were incorporated in all his dealings with people everywhere.

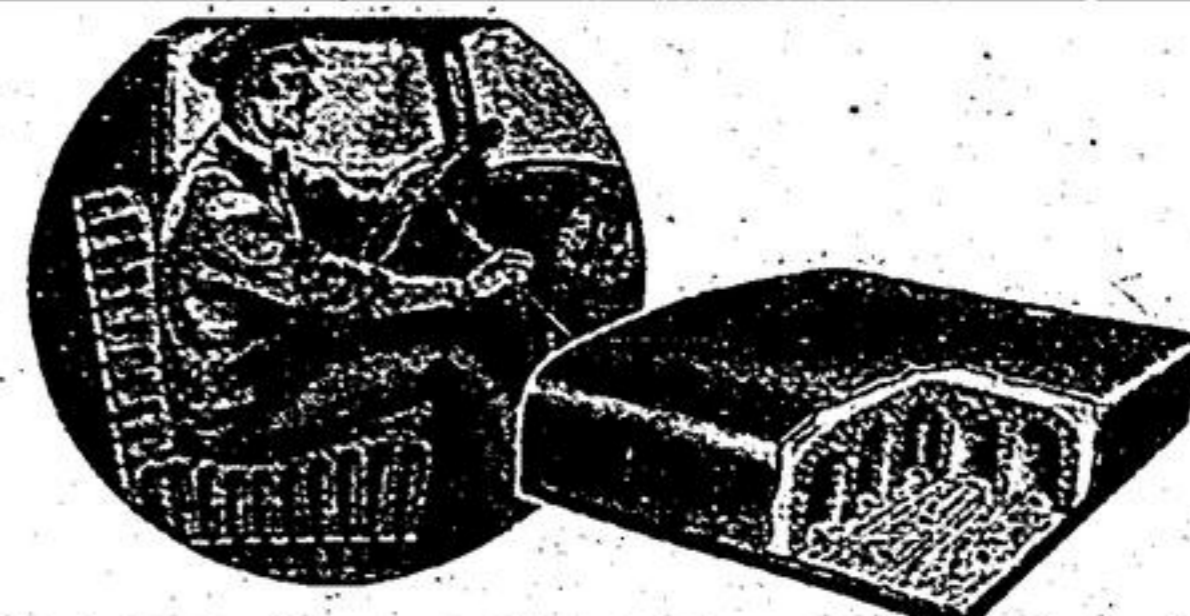

Acute Shortage Continues in Southern Ontario

With the critical shortage of power continuing in Southern Ontario, it is most necessary that everyone co-operate in saving electricity. The need is urgent. It affects the welfare of everyone. Do your part by saving electricity by every means at your command.

THE DAILY PERIOD DURING WHICH SAVINGS SHOULD BE EFFECTED IS BETWEEN 8 A.M. AND 8 P.M., AND CONDITIONS ARE PARTICULARLY ACUTE BETWEEN 4 P.M. AND 7 P.M.

HERE ARE SOME OF THE WAYS YOU CAN HELP

IN THE HOME

- Turn off lights when not required.
- Use the minimum number of lights in the living-room; consistent with good vision.
- Use electrically heated water sparingly and check leaking hot water taps.
- Do not use range elements on "high" when a lower heat will serve, and turn off all elements as soon as possible.
- Cook oven meals as often as possible and avoid the unnecessary use of surface elements.
- Turn off verandah and other outside lights.
- Turn off all small appliances as soon as possible.
- Do not use electric air heaters and grates.

IN STORES AND OFFICES

- Eliminate the use of electricity for signs and store windows from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- Turn off all lights when not required.
- Use electrically heated water sparingly and check leaking hot water taps.
- Do not use electric air heaters.

IN INDUSTRIES

- Switch from day to night operations wherever practicable.
- Turn off factory and office lights when not needed.
- Turn off motor-driven machines when not required and effect other savings wherever possible.
- Avoid the use of all non-essential outdoor lighting.
- Do not use electric space heaters.
