Lorne Rutherford Perkins Suddenly Summoned
The friends of Mr. Lorne Perkins were shocked to hear of his sudden passing on Thursday, Jan. 30th.
He attended to his school duties as usual on Wednesday and retired in health. At 4.30 a.m. he complained of feeling ill. A doctor was called but before he could arrive, the summons came.
Mr. Perkins was born at Victoria Square sixty-one years ago this March, to Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Perkins. His father, a teacher for 17 years in No. 6 Markham, dropped dead in the school at the age of 40, fifty-seven years ago.
Lorne lived with his mother, attended Richmond Hill High School, Newmarket Model School and Toronto Normal School. For a short time he assisted his mother on the farm for physical development, and taught school. He sold out his stock and implements and spent full time at his profession, teaching in two schools in Markham Township, no's 12 and 7.
At Christmas 1920, he married Isobel Read. His next school was at Maple. While there he had a call to go as principal of Courcellette School, No. 10, Scarboro, a position he has held for twenty-four years.
As in all urban centres, increase of population increased the duties of the school, and while he had a wonderful supply of energy, he occasionally admitted to his friends that the load was getting quite heavy.
Lorne is survived by his widow, one son Norman, a teacher on the Toronto staff and a daughter Audrey in Collegiate classes, a brother, Rolph E. on the home farm.
The funeral on Saturday afternoon from Wm. Sherrin's Undertaking Parlours, Toronto, was largely attended, his class from the school attending in a body.
The service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Mitchell, pastor of Kingston Rd. United Church, assisted by Rev. E. A. Currey of Victoria Sq.
The floral expressions were many. Interment was made in Victoria Square Cemetery, and the pallbearers were, Messrs. George Agor, Donald Pickering, Gordon Martson, F. Perkins, Clarence Sanderson and D. Read.
