Ajax Collision Has Court Sequel
Pleading guilty to a careless driving charge, Floyd Baldson, R.R.2 Pickering, was fined \$25 and costs or one month in jail by Magistrate Ebbs in court at Whitby.
Provincial Constable John Scott, testifying that the accused attempted January 12 to go through the red light at the Ajax corner, said that Baldson's truck proceeding across No. 2 Highway. The car was hit almost "dead on in the centre" but no one was injured, Constable Scott said.
"You tried to race the light evidently," Magistrate Ebbs remarked to the accused.

MARKHAM 2nd BAPTIST CHURCH RECORDS 69th ANNUAL REPORT
For 69 years the narrow Gothic windows of the red brick church, on the town line west, looked out over the early morning mists of Ratcliff's pond in summer, the grey branches of trees against the sky in winter; to the west, the changing modes of travel along the road so close to the white fence. Time took toll of some of the panes of frosted glass, repairs had to be made. The annual report given January 28th, 1947, of the preceding year, records that the old window frames were replaced by new leaded windows of amber tinted glass. Another important undertaking was the support by Second Markham church, of Miss Leonard of Toronto, graduate nurse, who sailed in November to China as a missionary under the China Inland Missions.
At the meeting presided over by Rev. Norman Rowan, reports were given by clerk Robert Ratcliff, church treasurer, Chas. Clubine, Miss Etta Wright for the W.M.S.; Mrs. A. Hutchinson for the Sunday School, and Bruce Clarke, Y.P.S. president.
In 1946 we received four new members; we are encouraged also to note that prayer meeting and church attendance have increased. Church receipts totalled \$3901.75, of which \$960.65 was for foreign and home missions, \$569 being paid in advance toward the 1947 missionary support. Part of the bequest of the late Mrs. Thos. Ratcliff, Stouffville, the amount of \$700 has been received, and earmarked to be spent on the church property as needed for repairs and improvements.
Besides this the W.M.S. raised \$94; S.S. offerings for missions were \$123 and Y.P.S. gave \$65 to missionary.
Mrs. Rowan replaces Chas. Ratcliff as music director. Otherwise church officials were re-elected throughout.
The very encouraging reports received from the various departments of our church are in truth a reflection of our spiritual progress, declared Rev. Norman Rowan, pastor.
