

## Cattle Breeders Elect Officers

Request for approval of a system to permit municipalities, by by-laws, to enforce compulsory warble-fly treatment was the main point brought out at the annual meeting of the Ontario Cattle Breeders' Association in Toronto, at which Geo. Rodanz, proprietor of Ringwood Farms, was made a director.

Members of the association, who spent most of the day discussing warble-fly control, felt that provincial and federal government should take an eye-to-eye view with them on the problem. It was pointed out that the recently introduced spray treatment has proved most satisfactory. However, even the less efficient brushing treatment is better than nothing.

During their meeting they heard Dr. Thomas Childs, acting Veterinary Director-General for Canada, hint of relaxation of existing regulations. Dr. Childs indicated that some rules regarding Bang's Disease might ease, but pointed out that "I don't want to be put on the spot in this matter."

Hugh L. Hill of Goderich was elected president of the association. Other officers are: Vice-president, W.J. Gardhouse; Secretary, W.P. Watson, Toronto; Treasurer, Brodie Ness, Portmouth; George Rodanz, Stouffville, and L. E. O'Neil, Toronto.

## W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

- Q.—We are living in a large house and can rent four or five rooms for housekeeping..... unfurnished. If we had undesirable tenants how much notice would we have to give if we rented by the week, by the month, or for a period of four or five months?
- A.—If your tenants sign a "term certain" lease for five months or less they may be expected to vacate at the end of the lease. Regardless of whether the rent is paid by the week or by the month tenants in shared accommodation are entitled to six months' notice to vacate. This notice must be given on the proper forms provided by the Rentals Administration of the Prices Board. However, if your tenants prove to be obnoxious and you want them to leave before a period of six months then you may apply to the Court of Rental Appeals for permission to give them notice at any time.
- Q.—For some years I have been a customer of a Chinese laundry. Early last summer I paid 15c for laundering a man's shirt. Then it went up to 17c, was reduced back to 15c and now they are charging 20c. Why are they allowed such increases?
- A.—Such increases are not allowed. While adjustments have been made in certain laundry prices for the work you had done the price must remain the same. If the laundry has been charging 15c for years they must continue to charge the same price now. As you sent in the name and address of the laundry we will have their prices checked at once.
- Q.—My children buy sandwiches at a small restaurant each day for lunch. This week the owner has increased prices on all sandwiches by 5c. Is it right that children should have to pay such prices?
- A.—A sandwich is a sandwich whether eaten by a child or an adult..... it costs the owner just as much to make. He is not allowed to increase all sandwich prices..... only hot sandwiches containing meat, fish, poultry, or eggs. For instance if the children have cold tomato, cheese or other types of cold sandwiches they should still pay the same price. Send in the name of this restaurant and we will check their prices immediately.
- Q.—Is 37c too much to pay for an eight oz. tin of salmon?
- A.—For the brand of salmon you purchased the ceiling price is 33c so 37c would be four cents over the ceiling. There are many different brands and grades of salmon..... sorry we cannot mention brand names in the column but a personal

## AN ARDENT HUNTER RICHARD CURL DIES

The oldest member of the Round Lake Hunt Club was carried to his resting place by six other members on Sunday, Feb. 2. He was Richard Curl, Zephyr, who died after a one-month illness at Whitby hospital on January 30 as a result of a heart attack. Born in 1858 at concession 16, Scott township, he was the son of English parents. In 1886 he married Mary Cleland who survives him. They recently celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary.

In early life he operated a horse-power threshing machine and a stumping machine in Scott township, and was a blacksmith by trade. He had a shop for a number of years on concession 5, Scott, and later in Zephyr. He also farmed north of Zephyr at one time.

Mr. Curl was an ardent hunter and fisherman, and went deer-hunting for 50 consecutive years. He had a collection of several deer-heads, a moosehead, and a large number of birds. He was an adherent of the Presbyterian church, and at one time was a trustee of S.S. 5, Scott.

Surviving besides his wife are four sons, William and Franklin, Zephyr, Fergus, Whitby, and Douglas, Bowmanville, one daughter, Mrs. Fred Walker (Aletta), Zephyr, 17 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

## KNOW THESE THINGS?

- Q.—How can I drive a nail into plaster without marring the wall?
- A.—This can be done without crumbling the plaster if the nail is placed in hot water for a few minutes, or dipped into melted paraffin.
- Q.—How can I launder a man's tie successfully?
- A.—Before washing the ties, baste them carefully to prevent the lining or padding from becoming lumpy. Remove the basting before ironing and the ties will look as when new.
- Q.—How can I make a good toilet perfume?
- A.—A good toilet perfume can be made by mixing two ounces of alcohol with one-half ounce of orris-root. Keep in a bottle tightly corked, and shake well before using.
- Q.—How can I test eggs for freshness?
- A.—Place the egg in a pan of water. If fresh it will lie on its side. If a few days old it will tilt upwards. If stale it will stand on end. If very old it will float.
- Q.—How can I separate a water glass that has become stuck inside of another glass?
- A.—Pour cold water into the upper glass to contract it, and then immerse the lower glass into warm water to expand it. They can then be separated very easily.
- Q.—How can I make a good furniture polish?
- A.—A furniture polish can be made of one part vinegar, with equal parts of linseed oil and turpentine.
- Q.—How can I remove a broken cork that has slipped down into the bottle?
- A.—Pour in enough household ammonia to float the cork, let it stand for a few days, and the cork will break into fine pieces without difficulty.
- Q.—How can I tighten the handle of an umbrella that has become loose?
- A.—Fill the hole in the handle with powdered resin, heat the rod, and press firmly into the hole.
- Q.—How can I remove a rusty screw?
- A.—Heat a poker or spike red-hot and apply it to the head of the screw. When the screw has become hot, it can be removed very easily.
- Q.—How can I remove the socket of an electric light bulb, when the glass bulb has broken off?
- A.—This can be done by pressing a large cork firmly into the socket. This will enable you to unscrew the metal part.
- Q.—How can I mend a tear in a kid glove?
- A.—Buttonhole around the edge of the tear before drawing together. Then over-sew the buttonhole together and the repair is substantial.

## Planning Board to Include All York

Climaxing a two-day debate which featured bitter denunciations and eloquent rebuttals, York County Council passed a resolution which provides for the reconstitution of the Toronto and Suburban Planning Board as a "Toronto and York Planning Board."

Submitted by Reeve Frederick G. Gardiner, Forest Hill, the resolution was passed by a decided majority, with one amendment, introduced by New Toronto Reeve W. E. MacDonald, which calls for setting up the personnel of the planning board after Dec. 31, 1948.

Personnel would be the nine members to be appointed, four by the City of Toronto, four by the County of York and one by the Ontario government.

Reeve MacDonald's original amendment called for five appointees by Toronto and three by the county after 1948, but Council accepted the suggestion of Reeve Hugh Griggs of Mimico that the same proportion of representation be retained as on the Toronto and Suburban Planning Board.

The Gardiner resolution was upheld by Markham Village and Stouffville when it came to the vote, but was opposed by Markham and Whitechurch townships.

## LEGHORN COCKERELS OFF FOR AFRICA

Twelve white leghorn cockerels from the Hambley Hatcheries, Winnipeg, are now on their way over C.N.R. lines to the seaboard enroute to the largest farms in Southern Rhodesia. Accommodated four to a crate, the birds were fed and watered during the Canadian portion of the long trip by Canadian National Express attendants. They will sail from St. John in the cargo ship Cargill. The birds were not at all worried about the necessity of understanding a new language.
