Memorial Rink for Claremont?

A general public meeting will be held in the Claremont Community Hall on Thursday evening, Feb. 27, at 8:00 o'clock to consider ways and means of building an up-to-date closed rink as a war memorial for the residents of the north half of Pickering Township. This meeting should be of vital interest to every family in the district as the proposed project would mean that a much needed recreational centre will be provided at comparatively small cost if everyone gets behind the effort.

A preliminary meeting was held on the evening of February 10, at which a few Claremont business men attended, and the handsome sum of \$1,400 was donated in cash to start this worthy scheme off. It is hoped that every family in the community will be represented at the general meeting—remember the date—Thursday evening, Feb. 27th.

Board Elected for Community Park

Dr. N. F. Tomlinson will head the new Claremont Community Park Board of five, including Jos. Farr, Ernie Baker, Geo. Constable and Fred Ward. Two members of Pickering Twp. council will also hold seats. There have been as many as eight and nine sitting on the Board the last few years. It was agreed that this body should hold regular meetings every two months commencing April 1st.

It was revealed that in the neighborhood of \$3,000 was raised last year by the means of dances and a field day.

Arena Again?

The question of an arena for Claremont or possibly Brougham and Claremont is again being suggested by some of the Park Board members, and it is understood that some money has already been pledged, if such a project was carried out. The Park has tried out the open-air idea, with not too much success, and this year the rink has not operated at all. Some residents of Brougham are anxious for a covered rink there, and it is thought that the two efforts might be combined. It is estimated that any desirable covered rink would cost in the neighborhood of \$12,000.

Warn Power Cycle Change Will Hit Household Purse
Municipal hydro representatives at the executive meeting of the O.M.E.A. in Toronto, expressed fear the public does not understand what is involved in the proposed change-over from 25 to 60-cycle power. Most consumers, they have found, believe the full \$200,000,000 cost will be borne by some big, impersonal central organization. They do not understand the individual householders will have to spend anywhere from \$15 to \$100 to have his household electrical equipment altered, the hydro men said.

It is not a simple matter of taking over a 25-cycle motor and putting in a 60-cycle motor, they said. A 25-cycle motor rotates at 1,500 r.p.m. while a 60-cycle motor has a speed of 1,800 r.p.m. Thus, new gears and pulleys must be installed with the new motor if the equipment it operates is to be turned at the proper speed.

Bulldozer Wins in Race with Stork

Path Carved Through 6-Foot Drifts For English War Bride Enroute to Hospital

An expectant mother, an English war bride, Mrs. John Hicks, Fairport Beach, Pickering Township, had her first real experience with Canadian weather when a bulldozer was required to carve a path through six-foot snowdrifts in a race against the stork.

Mrs. Hicks reached the hospital with hours to spare, but earlier in the day it was feared that the baby might be born without medical attention.

A snowplow tried to open the road to her home Wednesday morning, but broke a blade in the deep drifts. The Pickering Ratepayers Association and Deputy Reeve W. H. Westney made arrangements for a bulldozer to open the road.

It reached Mrs. Hicks Thursday afternoon. Her husband, who attends the rehab school at Ajax, drove behind the bulldozer with his wife in the car.

She was taken to the Women's College Hospital where a baby girl was born. Both are reported to be doing well.

and the probable cost, considering allowance for old motors:

Washing machine—New motor and new gears. If new gears are not installed, the washing machine will run too fast. Cost about \$15.

Refrigerators—Old style belt-driven, new motor and pulley at cost of about \$15. New type hermetically sealed units would have to be returned to the manufacturer for conversion, at cost of \$50.

Oil burners—Motors, transformers and controls would have to be changed at cost of \$80 plus labor.

Stokers—New motor, pulleys, controls and fan, at cost of \$90 plus labor.

Ironer—New motor, cost about \$15. The heating element does not require change.

Blowers—New motor and controls about \$25.

Electric clocks—\$3 to \$3.50 for adjustment.

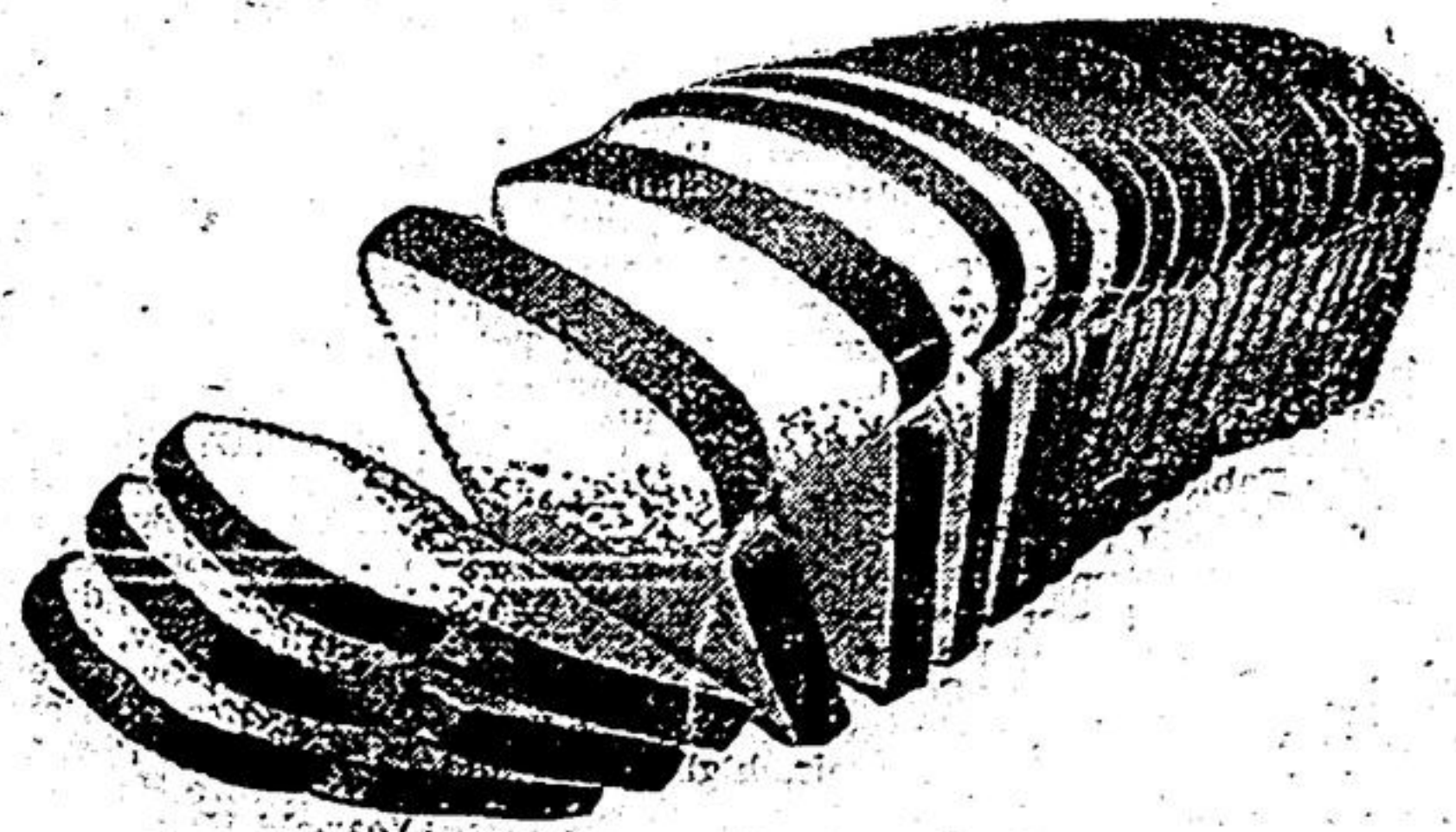
