

GROWS 124 BUSHELS OF CORN PER ACRE!



Dutton, Ont. (Special) — An outstanding corn yield of 124.8 bushels per acre grown on a selected 5-acre contest plot, has won the 1946 Canadian corn growing championship for Jack Witherden, Elgin County farmer, in the 9th Annual DeKalb Corn Growing Contest. He is pictured above (right) with his father Ernest Witherden.

Witherden's yield was accurately computed according to contest rules from a selected 5-acre plot that had been in corn the year before. The contest field was spring plowed, disked and harrowed, and 100 pounds per acre of fertilizer was used. On May 10 DeKalb hybrid seed corn, varieties 240 and 65 were planted in drill rows 40 inches apart.

Witherden won over a field of 97 Canadian contestants whose yields averaged 86.5 bushels per acre on their selected 5-acre contest plots.

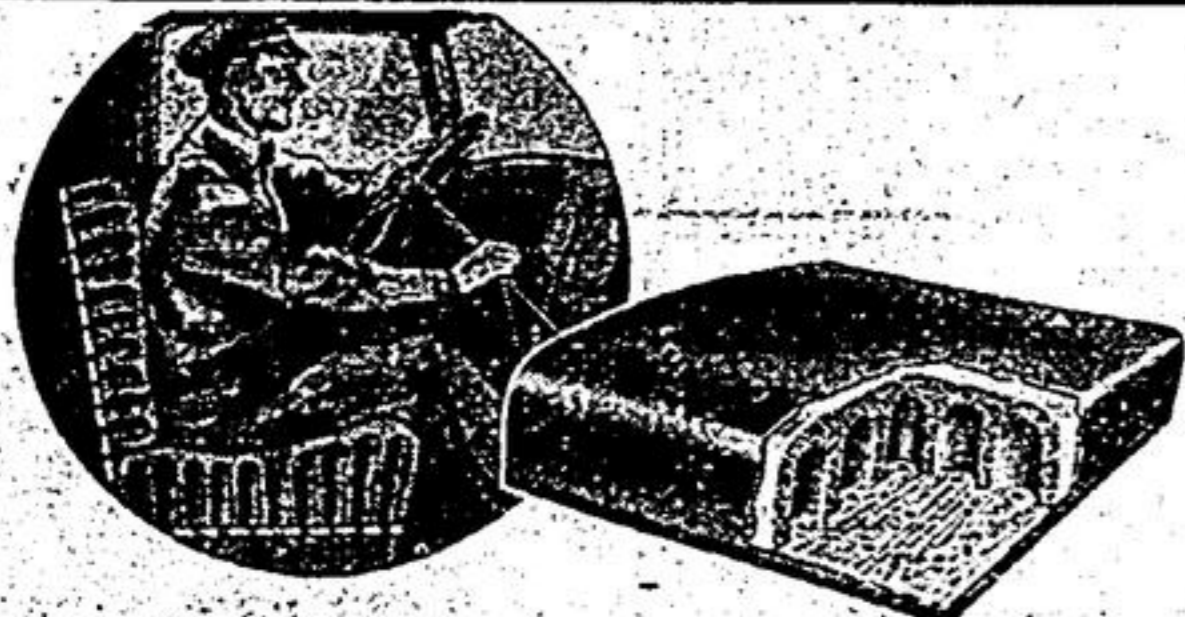

Hello Homemakers! Brides from other countries who are learning the Canadian way of cooking must not only adjust their cookery methods but also their cooking vocabulary. Articles of common use in kitchens here have names which differ from those in the homeland. Terms and equipment will gradually become familiar and genuine homemakers soon adjust themselves to existing circumstances — cheerfully.

Every new Canadian housewife, whether she comes from another land or whether she is taking that big step from office to home manager, should start by collecting good basic recipes. These might be kept in a card index or in a handy indexed scrap book. Classify menus under breakfast, lunch and dinner according to months.

Many experienced cooks collect The Mixing Bowl recipes too. They clip the column from the newspaper, cut out the hints and recipes and paste these on cards. You will need three-by-five inch cards along with a recipe file box and dividers, available in any stationery store. And if you buy two sets of index dividers you can build up two separate classifications under each letter of the alphabet; the classification titles should be entered on the index dividers.

CANADIAN MEAT LOAF

1 pound round or chuck steak minced, 1 tsp. salt, ½ tsp. pepper, ½ cup quick cooking oats, 1 cup wholewheat bread crumbs, 1 tsp. chopped parsley, ¼ tsp. sage, 1 small onion, finely chopped, 3 tbsps. tomato catsup or condensed tomato soup, ¼ tsp. Worcestershire Sauce, 1 egg, well-beaten. Combine all ingredients in large bowl. Mix thoroughly. Form in a

ring shape using hands or pack into a ring mould. Place in greased baking dish. Bake in electric oven at 325 degs. for 1½ hours. Lift on to hot platter. Fill centre of mould with green peas or combination of peas on carrots. Garnish with parsley. Yield: 4 to 6 servings.

CARROT CHEESE BALLS

1 cup cottage cheese, 1 tbsps. chopped parsley, salt, ½ tsp. finely chopped onion, 1 cup coarsely grated carrots, lettuce or other greens, mayonnaise or French dressing. Combine cottage cheese, parsley, a little salt (about ¼ tsp.) and onion. Drop spoonfuls of this mixture into grated carrot, coating evenly and shaping into balls.

Serve on lettuce or other greens with salad dressing. Of if desired, use to garnish a mixed salad plate. Yield: 2 to 3 servings.

UPSIDE-DOWN BREAD PUDDING

Scald 1 pint of milk. Pour over 6 slices of stale but not hard bread, broken into pieces. Add ¼ tsp. salt, ½ cup of sugar and 1 tsp. of vanilla. Let it stand about five minutes. Beat with a spoon so there are no big pieces of bread. Add 2 beaten eggs. Butter a casserole. Spread jam or marmalade or preserves over the bottom of the dish in a good generous layer. Pour the pudding mixture on top. Set in a pan of hot water and bake in an electric oven, 350 degs. about one hour, or until a silver knife inserted in the centre comes out clear, not milky. Loosen around the edge of the casserole and turn the pudding out on a plate upside down.

Whitevale and Uxbridge Men Hurt

Two men were rushed to the Oshawa General Hospital last week, one in a critical condition, following an accident in Oshawa, between an automobile and a Myers transport truck.

James Griffen, Whitevale, Ont., driver of the car, received severe head injuries and severe cuts to the eye and face and his condition is reported as critical by hospital authorities and Michael Oake, Uxbridge, a passenger in the car, received a severe laceration to the left and head injuries. F. A. Major, Whitevale, was not injured. The driver of truck, Jack Dunlap, Campbellford, also escaped injury.

Major is reported to have told police that the bright headlights of a car, proceeding east in front of the truck, blinded the driver of the car which was going west and consequently the car had crashed into the truck just to the rear of the cab.

The truck which was owned by the Myers Transport Company, Campbellford, was slightly damaged in the collision but police report the automobile was a complete wreck.

Police were unable to get details of the accident from Griffen, because he was in an unconscious condition in the hospital.

Major told police that he had been in Whitby with Griffen during the evening and that they were returning to Whitevale when the accident occurred. He said that Oake was a complete stranger to him and that Griffen had stopped just west of Whitby to give him a ride.

SCHMIDTS, SHANTZES STILL LEAD IN PHONE DIRECTORY

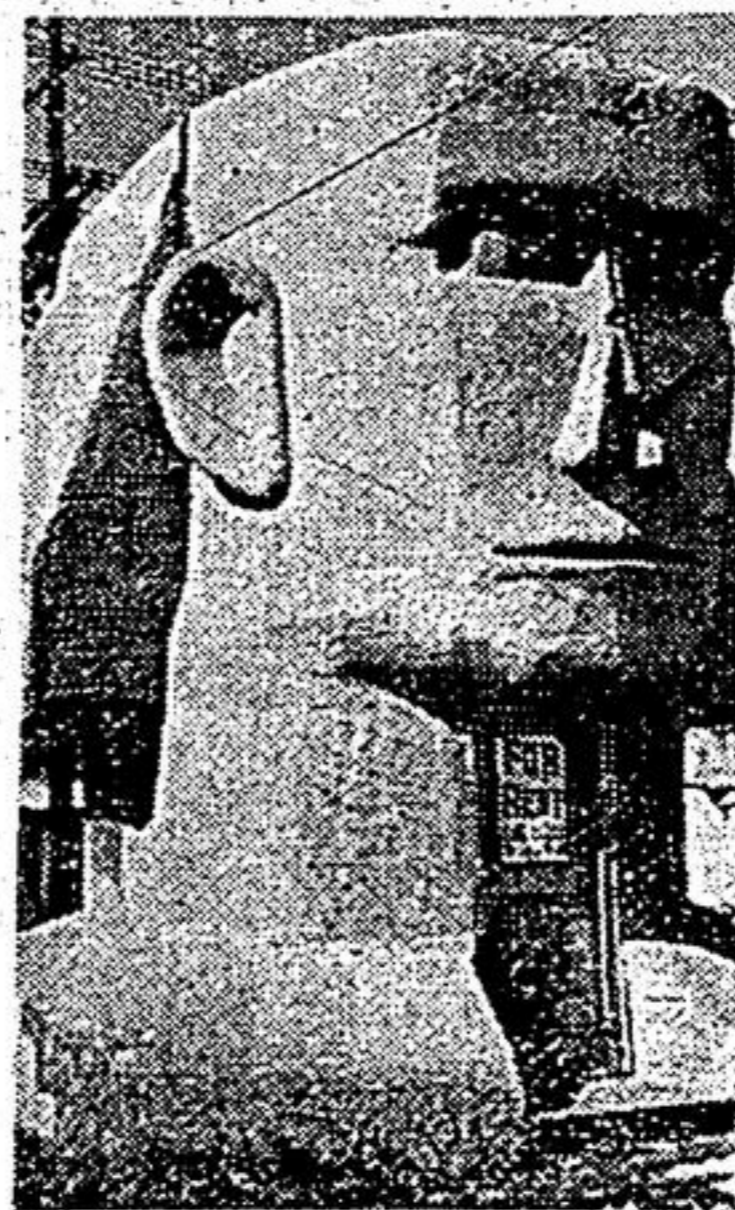
Those well known Twin City
