While many of the Township sideroads in and around Claremont were heavy during the fore part of the week, the main concession lines were open on Monday, although drifting snow was threatening to tie up travel at numerous points. Traffic was proceeding north and south on the Brock Rd., but the height of the drifts between the 7th and 8th concession is such that the plows will have difficulty should a heavy "blow" come. Plowing operations were dealt a setback on Monday when the Pickering Township maintainer broke down with a broken front wheel spindle.

Taxpayers Should Look to Council on School Question

Taxpayers in Claremont and that portion of Pickering lying north of the 7th concession should watch closely the movements of the County and the Township with respect to High School areas. Since it has been left to the township to set the boundaries of such new areas, members on Pickering Township Council must needs keep the financial interests of these taxpayers in mind. It has been suggested that all of Pickering Township go into an area with the town of Whitby which would bring an extra heavy burden of school tax upon ratepayers, many of whom have no interest in Whitby or the whitby school. The idea of transporting students all the way from Altona, a couple of miles from a good school at Stouffville, to Whitby some twenty miles away is preposterous

to even conceive. To house students from such an area would require Whitby to erect an immense school and operate busses for very long distances. The cost of the school alone would be at least \$300,000. The only expansion required in Stouffville to bring that school on a par with the best is estimated at only \$65,000. In setting the boundaries of these areas, the department and the county will abide by the wishes of the township council, so that ratepayers in this section should make it clear to the members of their council that they do not wish to be stranded in such a high priced area when it is not at all necessary.

Road Appropriation By-Law Passed

The Township of Uxbridge will spend \$17,000 on road account this year, according to the appropriation bylaw passed at the last council meeting held in Goodwood. This is a slight increase over 1946 expenditure, and in keeping with the insistent and increasing demand and need for better winter roads.

More grading will have to be done, roads widened and ditching improved to make winter plowing more feasible. Removal of many of the banks along the roadside will induce the snow to blow off the roads, and in the long run save the municipality money, while at the same time making it possible to keep roads open all year for general traffic.

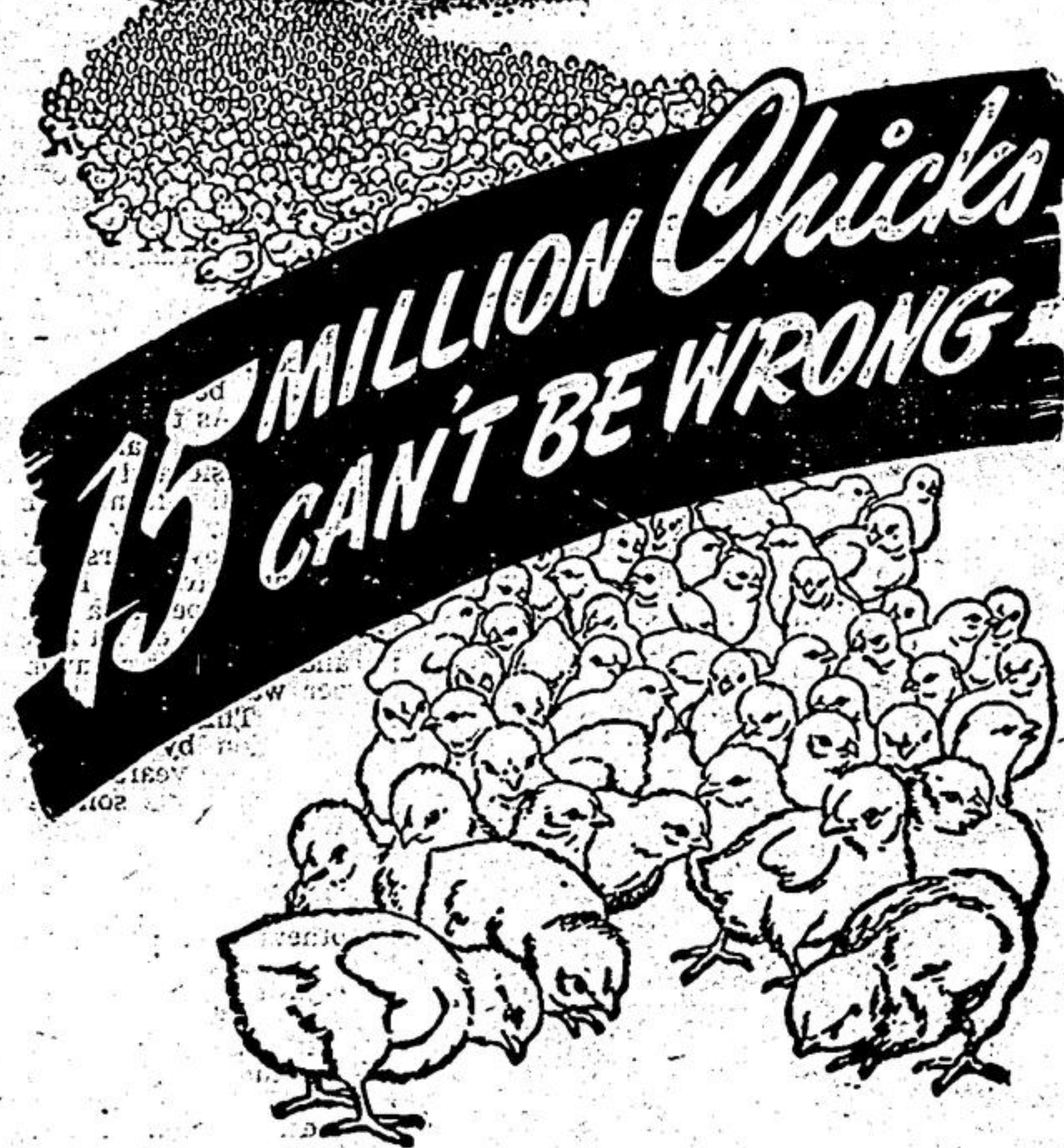
