Annual Meeting of Brooklin Fair Assoc. for 1947

The annual meeting of the Brooklin Fair Association was held at Brooklin on Monday evening. Mr. John Dryden, president of the Association for 1946, stated that last year's fair had been one of the most successful fairs that the Association has sponsored. There was a record attendance at the fair. The number of exhibitors had increased substantially over the previous year and the amount paid out in prizes had set a record. The new features that had been added to last year's show were well received. The Second Parish Show sponsored by the Jersey Breeders Association of Durham and Ontario Counties was very successful and also the Junior Farmers Section was very popular. He expressed the belief that the Directors should be constantly striving to improve their annual fair by adding new attractions and making some of the older features more attractive. He pointed out that the association was in an excellent financial state and that consideration should be given to an increase in the 1947 Prize List.

The Treasurer's Report, which was presented by Wm. Manning showed a cash balance of \$1,362.63. There was a large increase in the gate receipts, grants, donations and revenue from advertising over the

previous years. There was a substantial increase in the prize money paid to exhibitors. Also the dance sponsored by the Association in the evening was a financial success.

The Association decided to sponsor their 36th annual Spring Fair this year on Saturday, May 24th, at the Brooklin Community Park and with a dance in the Township Hall on fair night. The various Committees were appointed and they were instructed to be prepared to report at the next meeting by the Association their recommendations for an outstanding program for the 1947 fair.

WHERE ENTOMOLOGIST WENT TO THE DOGS

Apparently some of the amenities of life to a visitor to the Northwest Territories are not very enviable. In the summer of 1946 Alan G. Duttan, who is in charge of Garden and Vegetable Insect Investigations, Dominion Department of Agriculture, visited the settlements on the Mackenzie River for the purpose of making a study of garden and vegetable insects, because in some of the settlements there are flourishing flower and vegetable gardens. He made the greater part of his extensive journey in a single-seater aeroplane and since his return has made an enlightening report as a result of his official survey.

In every settlement visited dogs were all over the place. The traveller is conscious of them, morning, noon and night, because they make themselves heard and surround the villages on all sides as well as being present along the main streets. Most of them are huskies or have husky blood in them and are used as sleigh dogs during the winter months. There is a law up in the North which definitely states that all dogs over six months or younger ones weighing more than 30 pounds must be tied up when in the settlements.

Sleeping in the North in the summer months, due to so little darkness, is difficult for a visitor even without the noisy dogs but with the dogs around, it is impossible. From the time that daylight commences to wane these animals set up their weird howling and barking. The noise they make does not resemble in any respect the barking or howling of Eastern dogs. It is a weird mixture of howling, yelping, and screaming and is beyond any verbal description. It has to be heard to be believed. The howling is intermittent throughout the night — the animals giving tongue in chorus suddenly as though someone had fired a shot. There seems to be no reason for the outcry which appears to spring up spontaneously from all sides, within and without the village. It keeps up for a short period and then subsides almost as suddenly.
