More than 400 names were included in a petition of protest sent to the Ontario Liquor Control Board last week by residents and businessmen of Agincourt and vicinity. The issue concerns the application of the Tam O'Shanter Golf club for a dining room and lounge license.

"We have never had bars here before and there is no reason why we should be obliged to have them now," was the opinion of Rev. J. A. Terry, minister of Knox United church. He added that this was the first application for a license in Agincourt.

Answering objections by Agincourt residents, President William G. Sparkhall said the application was not intended to be a request for a cocktail bar, but for beer sale similar to that at other golf clubs.
