Jas. Ash Wilcox L. Feared Perished Off Atlantic Coast

Two women and 23 men are believed to have perished in the former lake freighter Novadoc of Toronto, reported to have foundered off Portland, Me.

The men include the following Ontario men: Chief Engineer James Ash of Wilcox Lake; Second Engineer William Christie, Paisley; Roderrick McLean and Alex Richards, both of Glen Robertson.

The skipper is Capt. A. J. Vallis, O.B.E., of Montreal, and also aboard the ship is his son, Allen.

Loaded with gypsum, the Novadoc last reported she was 22 miles off Portland, Me. The captain radioed: "One of our hatches is stove in. We are shipping quite a bit of water. And we are running before the wind to keep it down. Would like to have a coast guard boat sent out to stand by us until we make port."

"I think she foundered and all hands are lost," Lieut. Comdr. Geo. V. Stepanoff, commander of the U.S. cutter Algonquin, said on his return to Portland, Me., from the search.

The ship's disappearance may be the second mystery of the storm season, seamen said, recalling that the Boston fishing trawler Belle vanished Jan. 9 with a crew of 17.

Mr. Ash, it was learned from his home at Lake Wilcox, has been a chief engineer with the Paterson Steamship Co. for 10 years. Unmarried, he made his home with his father and brothers, Percy and Robert. A brother, Elwood of Toronto, is also a chief engineer with the same company. There are two other brothers, Lorne, at Madoc, and Jack at Newmarket. James Ash served with the steamship company in the northern Atlantic during the war.

"If there is anyone who can handle his ship, it is my Allan. He and our son, Allan Jr., will weather this storm all right," confidently declared the skipper's wife, Mrs. A. J. Vallis, of Ville St. Pierre, near Montreal.

"We're praying that any moment will bring word both are safe," said the skipper's wife, mother of seven children and seven grandchildren.

"Allan has been at sea since he was a lad and his father before him. Last word Mrs. Vallis had from her missing husband and son was last Saturday when Allan Jr. phoned from Digby, N.S."

"My son, Allan, said for me not to worry about them. They had come in from one trip and were going out on another. I asked him if he were a good boy, and he laughed and said he was always a good boy. I just know they will be all right. But I am worried a bit."

I. C. McEwen, operating manager in Montreal for the Paterson Line, called for a search from Cape Cod to New York, but there was also belief Capt. Vallis may have turned out to sea to escape the storm. Coast-guard planes have been engaged in the search along with surface ships.






