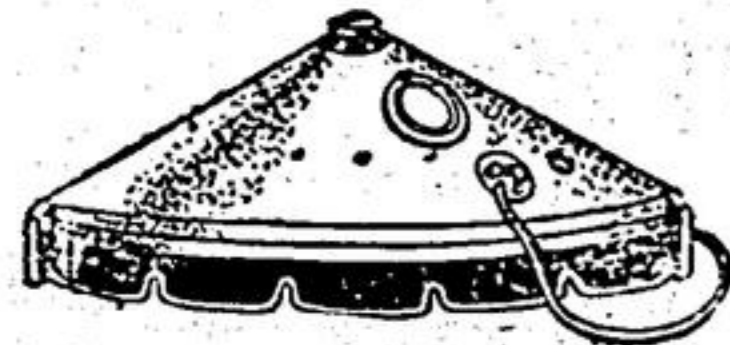

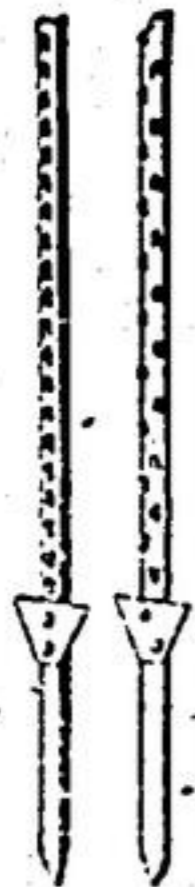
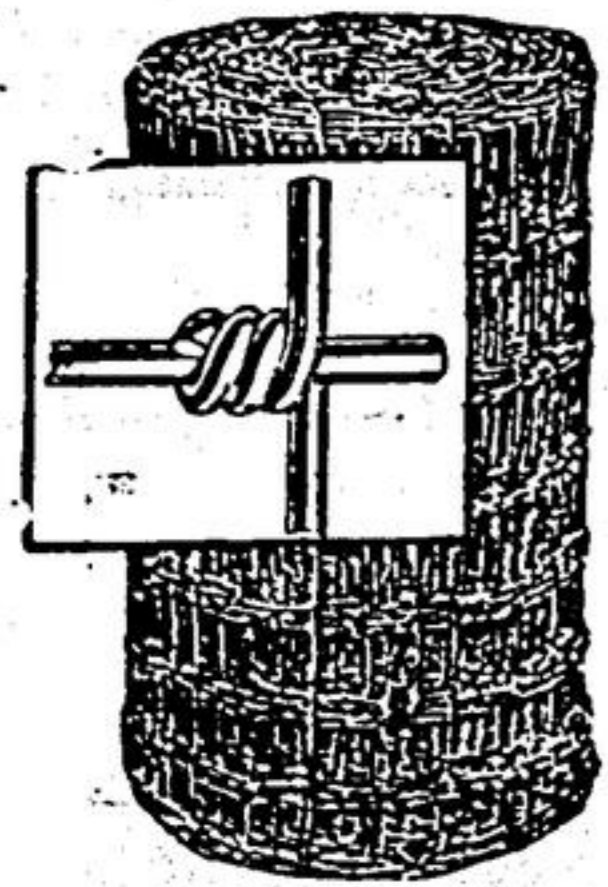

CURLERS RETURNING HOME INJURED BY STRAY HORSE ON ROAD

Game overseer Alf Hodgson and Mrs. Wm. Moynes, both of Lindsay, are in Soldier's Memorial Hospital, Orillia, following a collision between Mr. Hodgson's car and a wild western bronco six miles from Orillia on the Lindsay highway at 11.30 p.m. Tuesday. It is expected Mr. Moynes will be released from hospital right away, but authorities say Mr. Hodgson is suffering from a bad concussion with a possible fractured skull.
Chief R. H. Lawler, Constable Ross Endicott and the two who are in hospital were curling at Orillia and were enroute home.
Chief Lawler says they were near Udney when they noticed several horses coming towards the car. Mr. Hodgson who was driving his 1946 model Plymouth, swerved to the left to miss the horses and the car was immediately confronted by another horse. The road was

narrow at the point with large snow banks on either side and Mr. Hodgson could not avoid an accident, the Chief states.
The horse, which Constable Endicott says was a large one, hit squarely between the headlights smashed the front of the car's roof and went over the top of the car. All except Mr. Endicott were knocked unconscious by the force of the impact. He got out of the car, shook Mr. Moynes until he regained consciousness, and the three, (the Chief had in the meantime regained consciousness) worked to extricate Mr. Hodgson, who was pinned beneath the smashed-in roof. Shortly after he had been freed from the wreck Mr. Hodgson was able to stand by himself.
The animals which had just arrived from Western Canada were being unloaded at a railway station, when several escaped and were being hunted over the country at the time of the accident.
