## Drop Salmon Stock Eighty-Four Years In Pickering Stream On Same Farm

Pickering, March 29—Within the next ten years, if the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests is successful, anglers from many parts of Canada and the United States will be dipping lines into Lake Ontario and its tributary streams in hopes of hooking an Atlantic salmon.

The Department has been carrying out salmon experiments since 1944. In that year 40,000 Atlantic salmon fingerlings were planted in Duffin Creek, which flows through Pickering Township.

In 1945 and 1946 approximately the same number were again planted over the same area as in 1944, so that the results of three years might be compared.

Now the department is ready to assess results of the experiments and seeking answers to two important questions. Will the salmon survive and return to Duffin creek or will they enter other streams? And, can they spawn successfully?

The salmon for the experimental plantings were hatched from eggs shipped by rail from the Maritimes by the Dominion Department of Game and Fisheries. They were hatched at the Glenora Fish Hatchery.

When planted, the young salmon were one inch long. Curiously enough, the percentage of survival and the rate of growth have been found to be much better in some sections of the stream than others.

So far the test has revealed little except that salmon of all three plantings are still present in the stream and that the number surviving "seems very encouraging."

A bit of the background of a salmon's life was explained by the department. It was pointed out that salmon usually spend two or three years of their lives in streams before descending to a lake or sea.

It is known that salmon grow rapidly in warm water but in cool spring water they progress very slowly. Few survive in heavily-silted lower waters.

Their disappearance from Duffin Creek in the first place, nearly a century ago, is blamed partly on the fact they were kept from spawning beds by dams and because silt from cultivated land clogged the river bed and smothered their eggs.

It is believed that artificial hatching and planting of the young may be necessary to maintain stock, if it is found salmon can be brought back to Lake Ontario.

If you're around in ten years and ready for some fishing, remember that salmon formerly entered Duffin Creek in the autumn, and the Humber River in both spring and autumn.

In poor health for some time Ralph Jones, Altona, farmer died March 28th on the place where he was born 84 years ago this coming July. The Jones farm is actually located in the south-east corner of Uxbridge Township, and here the eight sons and daughters of Abijah and Mary Jones were born, now all deceased, with the exception of a sister Mary, who resided with Ralph.

A bachelor, Mr. Jones was a man of quiet disposition and took an active part in public affairs. He was a confirmed Liberal of the old school and all his life cast his vote only for the one party. He travelled very little and it is said that the number of nights he slept in a strange bed in his whole life, could be counted on one hand.

The funeral service on Monday afternoon was in charge of Rev. Gibson Brown, assisted by Rev. E. Morton. Pall bearers were Messrs. Lloyd Turner, Isaac Lehman, Fred Ramer, O. M. Madill, Fred Pilkey and Leslie Hodgson. Interment was made in the family plot at Dickson Hill.
