 It arrived in a shipment of 150 day-old chicks, from a commercial hatchery, and is now two weeks old. The chick has two normal legs, but between them, dragging on the ground when it hops, are two useless legs growing from a single thigh.
 "Every now and then it trips over the extra legs," says the owner's wife, "and then it gets mad flutters its little wings." Mrs. Booth describes the strange specimen as healthy and active.
