BUTCHER FINED BY W.P.T.B.

For selling meat at "over the ceiling prices" Clarence Silk, Pickering, was convicted in Magistrate's police court in Whitby, Wednesday, and was ordered to pay a \$100 fine and costs or serve two months in the county jail. The charge arose out of an incident in the butcher store owned by the accused in Pickering, when it was alleged by the Crown that Silk sold a three-pound roast of beef to Percy Smith of Dunbarton at a price stated by Magistrate Ebbs to be "exorbitant."

Smith told A.F. Annis, K.C., of Oshawa, who was acting for the prosecution, that he had bought the meat when informed by Silk that it was a sirloin roast. He said that he was charged \$1.50 for the meat which was later found to be not only of poor quality but also to be in a state described as "going bad." Smith said that he had gone directly to the W.P.T.B. office in Oshawa where he had registered a complaint against Silk.

Other Crown witnesses, former employees of the W.P.T.B. in Oshawa, stated that the meat was of a grade known to the trade as "cow beef" and was definitely not worth 50 cents a pound which the accused claimed he paid for it.

One witness, a butcher, formerly employed by the W.P.T.B., stated that the top selling price for that particular grade of meat was only 38 cents a pound.

Mr. Annis informed the court that on five previous occasions last year the accused had been charged

with breaches of Wartime Prices regulations and had been fined on each count.

Speaking in his own defence, Silk stated that the meat was not sold by him but by one of his clerks and that it had been sold at the wrong price because of an unfortunate error. He said that two days after the sale he had refunded the purchase price to the complainant and in addition had refunded the fare spent in going to the W.P.T.B. office in Oshawa.

Magistrate Ebbs in passing sentence said that "apparently this has been going on for some time and one can't help but suspect that you are not carrying on your business as you should or that you are not careful enough."

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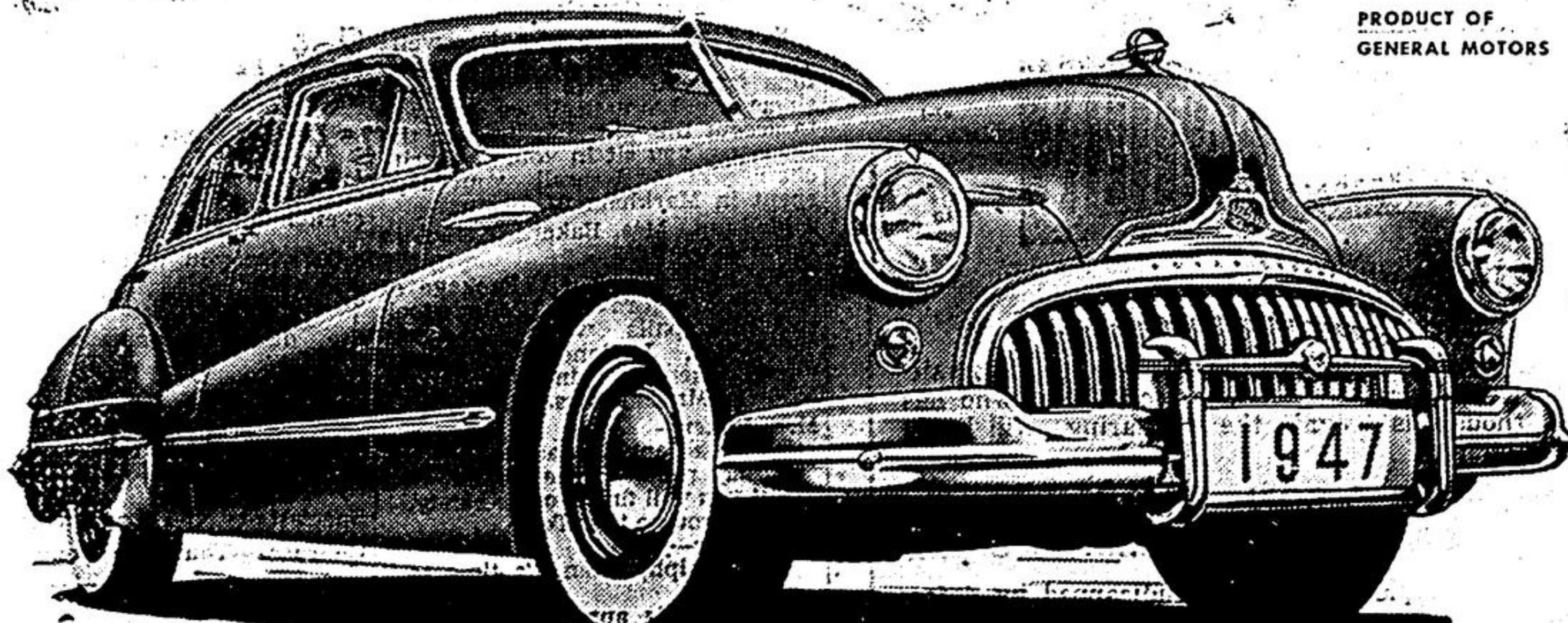
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
