### PRICE OF NAILS INCREASED BY 70 CENTS A KEG

OTTAWA, May 20—Part of a move aimed at bringing Canadian nail production up to 6,500 tons a month, the Price Board announced a ceiling hike in the price of nails, effective today.

The increase will amount to 50 cents a keg at the manufacturers' level and approximately 70 cents a keg at retail level.

A board announcement said the revision in the ceiling prices had been authorized to offset a substantial increase in the cost of kegs and other raw materials, and to enable the diversion of greater quantities of basic steel to nail production.

## Endorse Medical Plan To Offer All In Province

Patients Would Choose Own Doctors, and Doctors Choose Own Patients, is Proposal

The province-wide plan for health insurance which Ontario doctors endorsed last week at the final session of the Ontario Medical Association 67th annual meeting is expected to function by next September.

The plan's basic feature is freedom of action, both on the part of the patient and on the part of the doctor. The patient may choose his doctor and the doctor may choose his own patients. In this fundamental feature the plan differs from one of state medicine in which the province would direct individuals to salaried doctors who would each have a panel of patients.

"We are instituting the plan because we think there is a public demand for such a service," said Dr. C. C. White of Chatham, president of OMA.

An interim committee of seven, headed by Dr. Melville C. Watson of Toronto, has been set up and will meet to elect a chairman and to start drafting a definite plan of action for the new scheme.

**Eliminates Bad Debts**

The question of premiums has yet to be settled but it is expected payments on a monthly basis will be approximately \$2 to \$2.50 per person. Fees to be paid by physicians, surgeons and specialists have not been decided upon but the amounts will be uniform and though they may be lower than most fees now charged privately, many doctors will probably get higher incomes under the plan. Pre-payments will eliminate bad debts.

**Wider Protection**

Under the group plan proposed by the OMA the arthritic can expect care for his chronic ailment for the risk of enrolling him would be offset by the certainty of enrolling many healthy persons in the same group.

The group plan will also enable lower premiums than with the individual plan operated by AMS.
