SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON
 Lesson for June 1
Golden Text—For thus saith the Lord God, the Holy One of Israel: In returning and rest shall ye be saved, in quietness and in confidence shall be your strength.
 —Isa. 30: 15

The Lesson as a Whole
 The history of the kingdom of Judah from Rehoboam to Zedekiah is mainly one of vacillation and declension interspersed with remarkable periods of revival and blessing whenever the leader of the nation proved to be men with an active interest in the things of God and a real concern for the blessing of the people. Kings like Asa, Jehoshaphat, Uzziah, Hezekiah, and Josiah sought to stand against the onrushing tide of idolatry and were the means of bringing temporary deliverance to Judah. Priests and prophets like Jehoiada (2 Chron. 24: 2), Isaiah (2 Kings 19: 20), Jeremiah, and others witnessed against the evils prevailing, and sought to call the nation back to God. But although there were from time to time remarkable revivals, yet the general trend was downward, until at last judgment fell and the kingdom departed from Judah.

Hezekiah's reign was, on the whole, one upon which the divine approval rested, but even he failed in some particulars, chiefly in that of welcoming the ambassadors of the rising empire of Babylonia (2 Chron. 32: 31). In this he gave way to pride and thus presaged the final destruction of the kingdom. Through that very power. The attentive reader who is familiar with church history will recognize the way similar times of declension and revival have followed one another throughout the centuries of the Christian Era.

Verse by Verse
 2 Kings 19: 5.—"The servants of king Hezekiah came to Isaiah." Jerusalem was under siege of the Assyrian army, commanded by Rabshakeh, who had blatantly defied the God of Israel. Hezekiah sent messengers to the prophet Isaiah asking for special prayer that Jerusalem might be delivered.

Verse 6.—"Be not afraid of the words which thou hast heard." Isaiah sent back a message of assurance. The conflict was now between the king of Assyria and the God whom his servants had blasphemed. There could be but one result. The Lord would take up the challenge and prove His omnipotence.

Verse 7.—"He shall return to his own land; he shall fall in his own land." Sennacherib, the Assyrian king, was doomed to die. Fear of

CONVICTED OF FRAUD GIVEN 13 MONTHS SENTENCE
 A Toronto man, Allan Carr, entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to serve two months in jail on each of five charges of fraud, by Magistrate Frank S. Ebbs in Whitby Police Court. In addition the accused was ordered to pay a \$50 fine or serve an additional three months on one other charge. All sentences are to run concurrently with a previous sentence received in Toronto earlier on similar charges.

Crown evidence showed that the accused had obtained small sums of money from women in the Port Perry, Pickering Township and Whitby districts during March and April of this year, on the pretense that he would return to the various residences and photograph the children in the families.

George Weir, a Port Perry hotel proprietor, testified that the accused had arranged for a room at his hotel for a period of about a week and had left the hotel without paying his bill.

Police Chief George White of Port Perry testified that he had received complaints from several women in Port Perry that the accused had taken money but had not taken any photographs as he said he would.

Police Chief Jack Irvine told the court that he had received similar complaints from residents of Pickering Township.

William Elliott, Whitby police chief, stated that he had received complaints concerning the accused and had arrested him in a local hotel and preferred charges against him from information received from three Whitby citizens.

In passing sentence, Magistrate Ebbs said that he probably could add nothing more to what had already been told to the accused by the magistrate who had convicted him in Toronto on similar charges earlier in the week. He added that he hoped that Carr would see the folly of his ways while in jail and that it would influence his behavior when he was released.

invasion by the Ethiopians caused him to return home, leaving Jerusalem unsubdued. There he was to be assassinated.

Verse 32.—"He shall not come into this city, nor shoot an arrow there." Because of Hezekiah's reliance upon Jehovah He undertook to defend the city where He had set His name.

Verse 33.—"By the way that he came shall he return." The Assyrian onslaught was to prove utterly abortive. Their hopes of subduing Judah were vain, for God was fighting for His people.

Verse 34.—"I will defend this city for mine own sake." In order that His own name might not be dishonored, God would undertake to destroy the enemy and save His people. He could not forget His promise to David (Psa. 89: 20-37).

Verse 35.—"That night the angel of the Lord smote in the camp of the Assyrians an hundred fourscore and five thousand." It is evident that God sent a plague upon them so that the Assyrian army was literally annihilated. When the people of Judah arose in the morning their foes were all dead men.

Verse 36.—"Sennacherib departed and dwelt at Nineveh." The defeated Assyrian king returned to his capital, having failed completely to carry out his vain boastings.

Verse 37.—"His sons smote him with the sword." While worshipping in one of the idol temples Sennacherib was assassinated by two of his own sons. He was succeeded by Esarhaddon.

Chap. 20: 12.—"The king of Babylon, sent letters and a present unto Hezekiah." A great miracle had been wrought when God healed Hezekiah of a deadly disease. The Babylonians used this as a pretext to spy out the land of Judah.

Verse 13.—"Hezekiah shewed them all his precious things." It was evidently pride that led to this display of his wealth. Had the king asked counsel of the Lord he would not have been thus ensnared.

Verse 14.—"Then came Isaiah." The prophet heard of the reception given to these idolaters and came to inquire particularly concerning all that had been said and done.

Verse 15.—"There is nothing among my treasures that I have not shewed them." Hezekiah did not realize what was involved in this act of folly. He had fallen into a snare by failing to consult the Lord.

Verse 16.—"Hear the word of the Lord." The prophet had come to deliver a message of doom because of the weakness and carelessness of the king.

NOTED BASEBALL PLAYER, WOOD-WORKER, PASSES
AURORA—Funeral services were held on Friday for one of Aurora's best known residents Arthur Ashton. A native of Wainichurch Twp., he had lived in Aurora the greater part of his life. He was a skilled wood worker but had been retired for the past few years. He had been in ill health for some months. In his earlier days he was noted for his prowess as a baseball player.

Mr. Ashton was a Past Noble Grand of Aurora Lodge No. 148, I.O.O.F., and was also past district deputy. A few weeks ago he was presented by the Aurora lodge with a 50-year jewel. In politics he was a Liberal.

Interment was at Aurora cemetery and pallbearers were Lorne Hartman, James Kerswill, Charles Bodfish, Walter Dunning, Fred Davis and George Walker. He is survived by his widow, the former Vera Hulse. Rev. R. K. Perdue was in charge of the service.

THIS KNOWLEDGE
 Q.—How can I clean a fur successfully?
 A.—First beat the fur with a length of rubber hose, to remove all dust. Then rub hot bran or cornmeal into the fur, lay it away for a few days, and then brush it very thoroughly.

Q.—How can I remove paint and putty stains from window glass?
 A.—These stains can be removed with hot vinegar.

Q.—How can I prevent the piano strings from rusting during damp weather?
 A.—Try burning an electric light bulb inside the piano from time to time. The cost is small compared to the result.

Q.—In what way can I distinguish between lead glass and lime glass?

A.—Lead glass is very clear and durable. Lime glass is less clear, less durable, and is inferior to lead glass. If a glass rings when tapped, it is lead glass.
 Q.—How can I clean wicker furniture?
 A.—Salt not only cleanses wicker furniture, but prevents it from turning yellow. Make a strong solution of salt water and wash all the wicker furniture.
 Q.—How can I improve the flavor of cocoa?
 A.—If a drop of vanilla is added to each cup of cocoa after pouring, it will greatly improve the flavor.
 Q.—How can I make lime water?
 A.—Dissolve a fresh piece of lime in two quarts of water. Let it stand for two or three hours. Shake occasionally and remove any substance that might rise to the top.
