THE MIXING BOWL

Hello Homemakers! Come over for dessert and coffee anytime this month we shall have strawberries for sure. Served in a variety of ways the luscious berries are our favourite fruit. It does not take much time to hull and clean strawberries, but if they are to be kept fresh, the fruit must be spread in a pan and stored in the electric refrigerator. Any accompaniments such as cream, cake or biscuits should be fresh and delicate in flavour.

Fresh Strawberry Ice Cream
two-third cup sugar, 2 cups crushed strawberries, 1 well-beaten egg, ½ cup sugar, 1 cup thin cream, 1 cup whipping cream, whipped to thin custard consistency.

Add two-third cup sugar to strawberries. Allow to stand until sugar is dissolved. Combine egg, ½ cup sugar and thin cream. Add to washed berries. Place in refrigerator freezing tray. Set control to coldest point. Freeze until sides and bottom are slightly hardened. Remove and beat well. Fold cream into frozen mixture. Complete freezing. 6 servings.

Custard Milk
Scald 1 cup milk in double boiler. Meanwhile, stir together 2 tbsps. granulated sugar, 1½ tbsps. cornstarch, ½ tsp. salt, 2 egg yolks in a bowl. Gradually pour milk over egg mixture, while stirring. Return to double boiler. Cook over hot, not boiling, water, stirring constantly, until thickened. Cool; add ¼ tsp. lemon extract. Chill. Pour over strawberries.

Wheat Germ Biscuits
1 cup all-purpose flour, 1 cup wheat germ, 4 tbsps. baking powder, ½ tsp. salt, 4 tbsps. shortening, two-third cup milk. Sift the dry ingredients and cut

in shortening. Turn out on floured board. Knead quickly and lightly, and roll to one-half the thickness desired in the biscuit. Cut, place on buttered pan, and bake in electric oven, 450 degrees for 12 min. Makes 12 medium-sized biscuits. Split biscuits, butter and put sliced sugared strawberries in between.

Feathery Sponge Cake
1½ cups sifted cake flour, ½ tsp. salt, 2 eggs, separated, two-third cup cold water, 1 cup sugar, ½ tsp. lemon extract.
Add salt to sifted flour and sift again. Separate eggs, putting yolks in large mixing bowl, whites in smaller bowl. Add water to yolks and beat until mixture is 1 qt. in volume, continue beating if not 1 qt. Sprinkle in 2 tbsps. sugar then gradually beat in the remainder for another 2 minute-beating. Fold in the flour gently; add extract.
Wash and dry beater and whip

egg whites until stiff. Fold whites in egg mixture and pour into an ungreased 9 x 9 x 2 inch pan. Bake in a preheated oven of 350 degrees for 30 mins. Invert pan on rack and let cool before removing.

The Question Box
Mrs. M. J. asks for Oatmeal Cheese Sticks recipe.

½ cup milk (scalded), ¼ cup oatmeal, 1 cup all purpose flour, ¼ tsp. salt, 1 tsp. sugar, 1½ tbsps. baking powder, 2 tbsps. shortening, ¼ cup grated cheese.

Pour the scalded milk over the dry oatmeal and let stand for 10 mins. Sift flour, salt, sugar and baking powder together and cut in the shortening. Add cheese. Combine with the milk mixture. Turn out on a well floured board and knead lightly for about ½ min. Roll dough into pencil-thin sticks about 4 inches long. Bake on greased cookie sheet in electric oven (425 degs. F.) for 12-15 mins. Makes 3 dozen. Serve with a dish of strawberries.

Miss T. B. asks how to prevent French dressing from separating?

Answer: Beat in an egg white and shake before using.
Mrs. G. C. says: To remove batter from a hand or electric beater, work the beater slowly as you remove it from the batter.

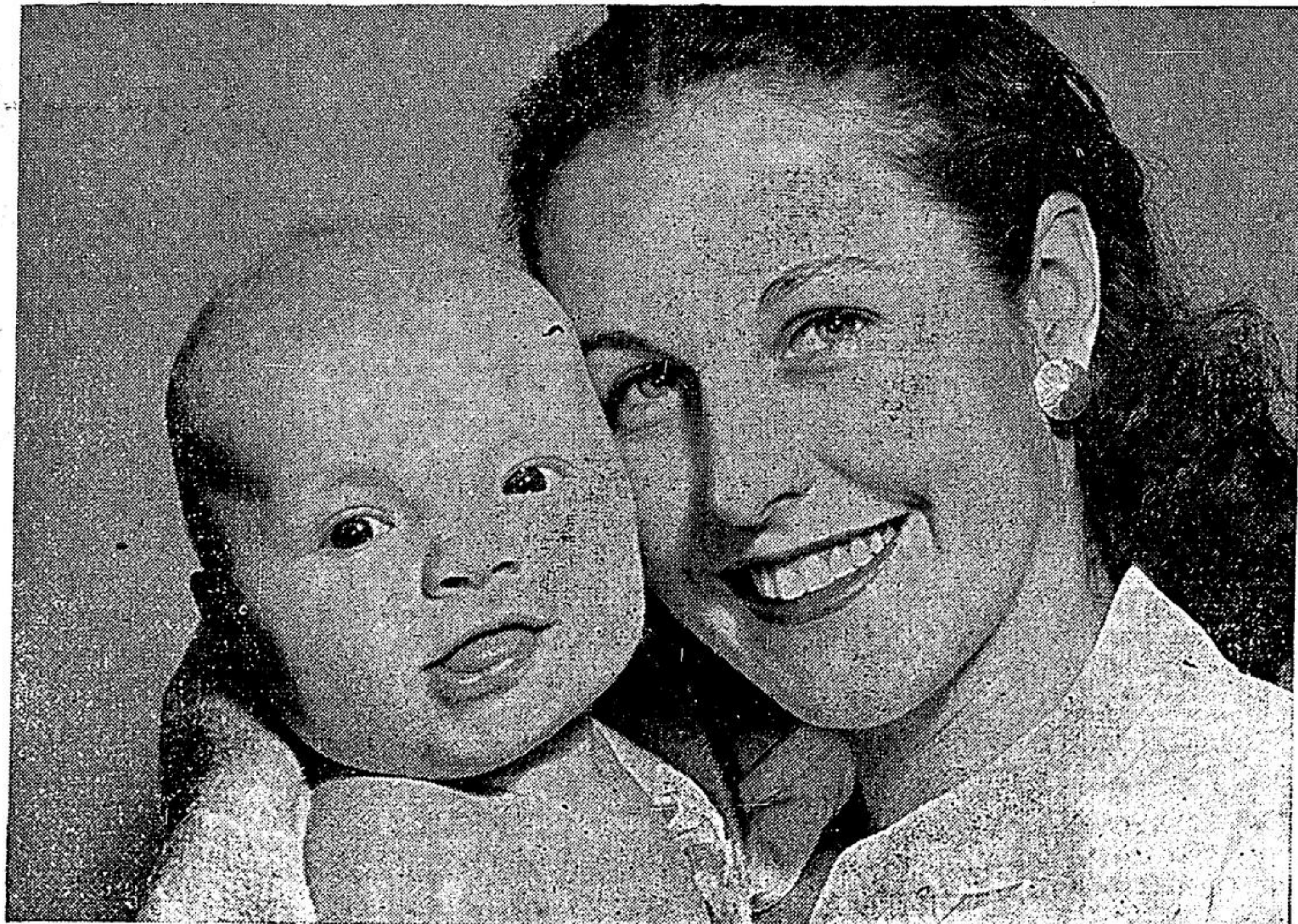
