who gave it to me and my body I recommend to the earth to be buried in a Christian like and decent manner and as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life I give devise and dispose of the same, in the following manner and form. Imprints it is my will and I do hereby order in the first place that all my just debts and funeral expenses be paid and satisfied as soon as conveniently may be after my decease.

I give and bequeath to my son Daniel Heisey his heirs and assigns, that certain tract of land situated in Lebanon Township Dauphin County aforesaid, and as bounded and described by the lines as follows (to wit) beginning at a stone corner, thence by land of Henry Heisey north twenty degrees east one hundred and seventy perches to a corner stone, thence by land of Christian Jordy south eighty degrees east one hundred and thirty-two perches to a white oak, thence by land of Michael Gingery, south twenty-seven degrees east eighty-seven perches and one-half to a corner black oak, thence by land of Jacob Jordy north eighty degrees east thirty-eight perches to a corner stone thence by the same south six degrees east eighty-four perches to a _____ thence by land of Philip Ulrich north eighty degrees east one hundred and four perches to the place of beginning containing one hundred and eight acres and allowances for roads, etc. together with buildings and improvements thereon. To be held by him my said son Daniel Heisey his heirs and assigns forever. It is my will that my said son Daniel Heisey shall pay for my said land, the sum of one thousand pounds in gold and silver money of Pennsylvania that isto say two years after my decease the sum of forty pounds and the yearly and every year the sum of forty pounds until the aforesaid sum of money is fully paid and discharged. I further give and bequeath unto my said son Daniel Heisey, in the bargain and price he is to pay for my said land, all the grain I have in the ground on said land which I have heretofore given unto him and all my grass and hay and crop and all kinds of grain which I have on the aforesaid land bequeathed unto my son Daniel Heisey, two of the best of my horses or mears in my stable or the choice thereof of my large wagon and swingle trees and two pairs of gears with the brith bands and log chain and wagon cloth, harrowplow and plow irons, swingle trees, two of the best of my cows, two sheep, over and above what he has to pay for my said land and in the price of the same.

It is my will and I do hereby order, that my said wife Barbara shall have full right and privilege, to the one-half of all my house wherein I now live during her natural life, with stove and pipe in the house where I now live with the dresser and table therein.

I give and bequeath unto my said wife, all my house hold goods and furniture, or as much as she needeth or doth request. I give unto my said wife Barbara my house clock during her life, with all my bed and bedsteads and kitchen furniture and kettles and potts, pails, tubs, chairs.

It is my will that my said son Daniel shall deliver unto my said wife Barbara the flour of twelve bushels of good wheat and fifty pounds of good hog meate, fifty pounds of beaff, one bushel of salt yearly and every year during her natural life. But it is my further will that my said wife shall have full right and privilege if she shall think proper, to eat at my son Daniel's table and be sufficiently supported by him.

It is my will that my son Daniel shall find and provide for my said wife Barbara during her natural life sufficient meate, drink, working appavell and lodging and all sorts of clothing, and fire wood as she shall order and direct agreeable to my said wife's will and pleasure, over and above what he has to pay for the land aforesaid, all shall be delivered and performed by the will and satisfaction of my executors hereafter named agreeable to their will and pleasure, my said wife shall have as much apples as she shall stand in need of, out of my orchard. Two barrels of good slder delivered in my cellar and Daniel shall find the barrels and three

gallons of rye liquire and as much butter as she needth and also eggs and hens and all and everything as she needth yearly during her natural life. To be delivered by my son Daniel. But in case my said wife eates at my son Daniel's table, and does not stand in need of said flour, hog meate and beaff, then my said son Daniel shall be free from delivery of the same.

I give and bequeath unto my son Henry Heisey his heirs and assigns a certain tract piece or parcel of land situated in Lebanon Township Dauphin County and is bounded and described by the lines as follows to wit. Beginning at a stone corner thence by the land of Philip Ulrich north eighty degrees east one hundred and seven perches to a corner post, thence by land of Baltzer Orth, north eighty perches and a half to a hickory corner, thence by land of Michael Ulrich and Christian Jordy, west one hundred and sixteen perches to a marked hickory corner, thence by said land of Christian Jordy north twenty-two degrees west sixty-six perches, to a corner black oak, thence by the same south eighty degrees west twenty-three perches to a corner post, thence by land of Daniel Heisey south twenty degrees east one hundred and seventy perches to the place of beginning. Containing sixty acres and sixty perches and the allowance for roads be the same more or less. To be held by him, Henry Heisey, his heirs and assigns forever. It is my further will that my son Henry Heisey, shall pay for the said last described tract of land the sum of seven hundred pounds in gold or silver money of Pennsylvania, that is to say, forty pounds one year after my decease, and so on yearly until the aforesaid sum being paid and discharged.

I give and bequeath to all my children, that is to say, Peter Heisey, Magdalean, now the wife of Christian Stuckley, Christian Heisey, Jacob Heisey, Henry Heisey, Daniel Heisey, Barbara Heisey and Joseph Heisey, all the money arising out of all my lands and personal estate to be equally divided between them share and share alike, except what I have heretofore given unto my said wife Barbara, and my son Daniel Heisey.

I give and bequeath unto my said wife Barbara, during her natural life, the sum of twelve pounds gold or silver money of Pennsylvania, which shall be paid unto my said wife yearly and every year out of my estate by my executors hereafter named, as my executors think proper. And then, my said executors, shall in the first place retain in their own hand out of my estate as much money to enable them to pay unto my said wife the aforesaid twelve pounds yearly as above directed and no otherwise.

It is my will that the aforesaid yearly payment arising out of and becoming due out of my estate of lands aforesaid, shall be paid unto my two eldest children, first that is to say to each forty pounds and so on yearly as they succeed each other in age and no otherwise.

I further give and bequeath unto my said daughter Barbara one cow worth the sum of seven pounds ten shillings gold or silver money over and above her equal share with one of the rest of my children.

It is my will and I hereby order that in case either of my children have received in money or goods more than the other from me, such child or children shall not receive any money out of my estate until such child or children shall receive as much in goods or money as the other of them received of me in my life time. I do hereby empower my executors hereafter named to sign, seal and execute a good and sufficient deed or deeds unto my said two sons, Daniel Heisey, and Henry Heisey, and to their heirs and assigns forever for all the lands which I have heretofore given unto them when and at such times as my executors shall think proper.

And lastly, I do hereby nominate and appoint my brother-in-law Christian Jordy, and son Henry Heisey, of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking, disannualling and making void all former and other will and testaments by me heretofore made, ratifying and confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament. In witness whereof the said John Heisey have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year aforesaid.

W.P.T.B. QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

- Q.—My grocer charged me 10c for a lb. of sugar. I think this should be investigated.
- A.—We have told the story of sugar many times but are glad to repeat it if you are in doubt about the price. Each store has been allowed to charge the same prices as they charged in 1941. At that time most stores were charging 8c and continued to do so until recently. A few other stores charged 9c a lb. and that price prevailed. Some weeks ago the price of sugar was allowed to increase one cent a lb. and this increase was added to the 1941 price. As you gave us the name of the store charging 10c we will check their prices.
- Q.—What can I do with tenants who will not vacate two rooms in my home? They have been given the proper six months' notice on the correct forms.
- A.—Apply to the courts for an order to have your tenants evicted.
- Q.—I paid \$12 for a pair of white shoes and am sure I was overcharged, as I never paid more than \$8 or \$10 for the same thing before.
- A.—Sorry.....there is no ceiling price on footwear and each store may set their own price. Our only suggestion is to shop around and find a store where you can still buy shoes for \$8.
- Q.—I have tenants in a house I own. Some time ago one of their daughters married. The married daughter, her husband and child have moved in. Are they allowed to do this without paying extra rent?
- A.—If your tenant is renting three or more rooms in this house you may apply for a 10% increase in rent. Applications must be made on forms provided by the Rentals Administration and for your convenience a set for forms has been mailed to you today.
- Q.—Will we receive any more canning sugar this year?
- A.—Yes..... five more coupons will be declared valid on July 17. These coupons will be valid for the purchase of one pound of sugar each.

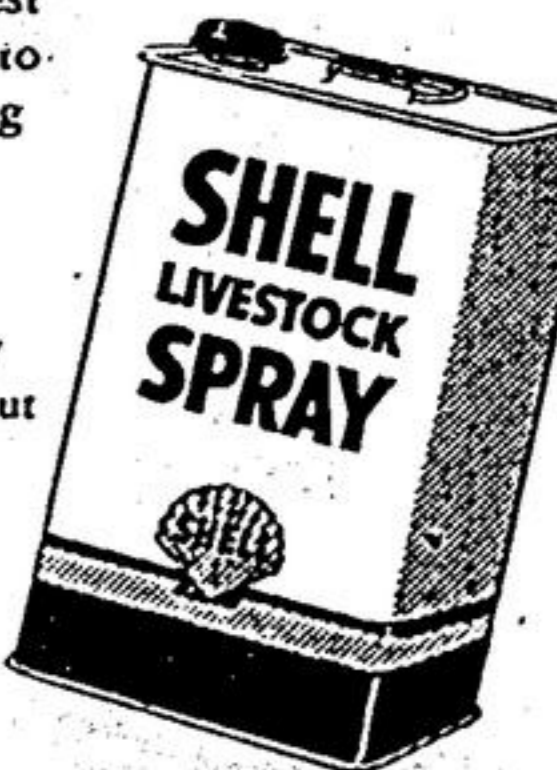
