**Hollinrake Gets
Magistrate Post**

The appointment was announced by Attorney-General Leslie Blackwell of Col. Osborn Shore Hollinrake, OBE, KC, as magistrate to fill the vacancy created by the death of Magistrate W. V. McIlveen.

Col. Hollinrake was born in Ingersoll and educated at the University of Toronto Schools, the Royal Military College and Osgoode Hall. He was called to the Bar in 1923, practiced law with the firm of Galt, Gooderham and Towers, and later was with F. W. Bartrem, under the firm name of Hollinrake and Bartrem. He was appointed KC in 1938.

Col. Hollinrake served with the Royal Artillery in France and Germany in the first Great War. He later served with the Canadian Militia, and was commandant of the Seventh (Toronto) Regiment of the Royal Canadian Artillery at the outbreak of World War II.

In 1937, Col. Hollinrake was awarded the efficiency decoration, and in 1944 was created an officer of the Order of the British Empire, received at an investiture by His Majesty at Buckingham Palace.

The Colonel has a branch law office at Stouffville, and a summer home at Ballantrae, and his scores of friends here are delighted with his elevation to the bench.
