

VAST OIL BEDS STILL UNTAPPED IN CANADA, HINT

A sedimentary basin 500,000 sq. miles in area offers hope of greatly increased oil production in western Canada. Dr. O. B. Hopkins, vice-president of Imperial Oil, told 500 delegates to the convention of the Chemical Institute of Canada, at Banff.

Canada last year used 70 million barrels of oil, twice as much as in 1932. Only 10% of the total was produced in Canada, mostly in Alberta. The West depended on marketing its farm products on world markets

or at least against world competition. Since the cost of oil products figured largely in agricultural production costs today, it was important that oil costs go down, and this was predicted on finding local supplies of crude oil.

Dr. Stacey Ward of the University of Birmingham, England spoke on utilization of coal as a raw material for chemicals. He said more than a billion tons of coal were cut away from the earth's surface each year. Although industrial civilization had been based on coal for two centuries, surprisingly little was known about its chemistry, he said; new chemists were engaged on research into its mysteries. One reason for this was that coal was such a complex material, and another was that it had been used so long as a fuel, it was taken too much for granted.

Today, however, coal was being used more and more for chemical uses such as a base product for plastics and dyes. In all some 350 chemical products were being taken from coal. Dr. Ward said greater research in this field would pay rich rewards.

YORK CHILDREN'S AID BODY TO JOIN COMMUNITY CHEST

Budget Increased From \$50,000 in 1936 to \$220,000 This Year, President Reports

"Increase in the cost of operating York County Children's Aid Society has been astounding. The budget in 1936 was \$50,000, whereas this year is \$220,000," declared Reeve F. G. Gardiner, Forest Hill Village, president, in a special report to York County Council last week.

"All provision for social services should not be solely the responsibility of real estate," contended Reeve Gardiner in urging that the society become a member of the Greater Toronto Community Chest, as recommended by its board of directors.

Reeve Gardiner censured the policy of the government in setting up rules and regulations for such societies and then contributing but a small portion to the cost of their operation.

"The government insists on classifications of societies and tells us how to run our society, but gives us only \$1,500 of a \$220,000 budget," he contended.

Family Allowances for Children under the care and expense of the Society, does not go to reduce the cost of the maintenance. The Dominion government has so fixed it, that this money is merely an "extra" and since it has been instituted the cost of keeping children in foster homes has increased sharply. One society bidding against another for homes has forced the York Society to maintain rates in rural parts higher than they might be.

NEW POLICING FOR EXBRIDGE AND AJAX

The Ontario provincial police, taking over police duties in an increasing number of smaller municipalities, added 82 new constables to the force during the past year and is installing a new frequency modulation radio network that will blanket the whole of Southern Ontario.

Since the police act was passed a year ago 41 municipalities have made agreements for Provincial Police Service. The addition of 82 new constables to take care of these municipalities has raised the uniformed strength to 612.

Barrie is the largest town to have made an agreement and it now has a force of 11. Other towns are Alexandria, Amherstburg, Arnprior, Cobalt, Cochrane, Georgetown, Hearst, Ingersoll, Merriton, Mount Forest, Sioux, Lookout and Van-leek Hill.

Villages being served are Beamsville, Bradford, Eganville, Elora, Fonthill, Port Dalhousie and Rockcliffe Park.

Townships are Bayham, Berti, Brantford, Cosfield South, Maidstone, Mersea, McKim, Neelon and Garson, Nipigon, Schreiber and Wainfleet. Completing the list are Ajax Community, Atikokan and Beadmore districts, Colchester South municipality, Espanola township, Malton area, McGarry district, Terrace Bay township, Uxbridge municipality and Wasaga Beach district.

"The new radio installation, first of its kind in Canada and one of the continent, is being installed this summer at a cost of nearly \$500,000.

Some 300 police cars will be equipped with the two-way radios.

Shetland Ponies First in 20 Years

"Who pays the difference in shipping charges when 23 ponies are ordered and 25 arrive?" was the problem faced by John Miller and son of Ashburn, recently, when they received the first shipment of Shetland ponies to arrive in Canada since 1925.

Mr. Miller had ordered 23 ponies to be shipped from the British Isles, and during the voyage, two of the ponies foaled. When the ship docked at Montreal, Mr. Miller found that he had two new born Shetland pony colts, as well as the 23 ponies he had ordered. When the problem of shipping charges was settled, Mr. Miller got the two colts for paying the duty tax for bringing them into the country, but there were no extra shipping charges for the pair born in transit.

Last week the ponies were wading through grass as high as themselves on Mr. Miller's farm, just west of the village of Ashburn.

The ponies, who came to Canada, after one of the worst winters in the history of Scotland, are finding their new home much different from where they were born. Being brought up in the Shetland Islands the ponies were subjected to rigorous conditions. Feeding of grain to the animals was not permitted because it was too scarce, so all winter the animals were forced to

browse in the unusually heavy snow for food. Many times they were forced to eat the ends of tree branches, which were weighted down to their level by the heavy load of snow. Although they have been in Canada only two weeks, the ponies are already showing signs of change. They were very thin when they arrived, but two weeks in their new home has made a lot of difference. In addition, their long coats of shaggy hair are beginning to thin out in the new climate, and they are becoming increasingly attractive.

Since the arrival of the ponies, Mr. Miller has received a great many inquiries, particularly from

the United States, about them, and a good many people have visited the farm to see them. In the same shipment as the ponies, Mr. Miller also received Shorthorn cattle, Aberdeen Angus cattle, and many different breeds of sheep. He also received a long horned, shaggy haired Highland bull, belonging to the Province of Saskatchewan.

Receiving a shipment of imported ponies is no new experience for the Miller family. Mr. Miller's grandparents were among the first importers of many varieties of stock from the British Isles, and they received their first shipments nearly 100 years ago.
