

BISHOP HALLMAN, 81, IN PULPIT 50 YEARS

Kitchener, June 26-Fifty years of service in Canada and the United States of Bishop E. S. Hallman of Tuleta, Texas, was commemorated tonight at the Kitchener church where he was ordained exactly half a century ago.

The S1-year-old minister, still active in the work of the church in Texas, is at present visiting in this district. The special service to commemorate his induction will be held at First Mennonite Church.

Following his induction, Bishop Hallman served his church in the Kitchener district for about ten years. From the city, he went to Saskatchewan, where he served for 15 years.

Several years in Indiana marked his next service after which he commenced his long charge in Texas. He is still active at Tuleta.

The bishop is a native of this area, born in New Dundee to the late Mr. and Mrs. Abraham Hallman. While in this district he is visiting at the home of a sister, Mrs. Ephraim Snider of R.R.2, Kitchener.

M. C. Cressman and J. C. Fretz of Kitchener were in charge of arrangements for the special service.


