LAW TIGHTENS ON MOTORISTS

The law tightens up on Ontario motorists this week under provisions of amendment to the Highway Traffic Act which becomes effective July 1.

Major amendment to the act is the "unsatisfied judgments fund" whereby the province will undertake to reimburse those who obtain a civil court judgment as the result of a motor accident.

Under the amendment legislation there is the continuing provision that persons failing to satisfy a judgment in relation to motor vehicle operation will be prohibited from owning or driving a car.
