LINDSAY CATTLE EXPORTED TO UNITED KINGDOM

The largest shipment of pedigreed Holstein heifers to be sent to the United Kingdom since before the war were recently handled over the lines of the Canadian National Railways. The 150 head of prize cattle were transferred on board the S.S. Manchester Progress at Montreal.

From Murco Farms, Lindsay, owned by W. J. Murphy, one of the oldest and largest exporters of dairy cattle in the Dominion, the herd was the first of three similar shipments to be made this year to England and Wales.

The purebred heifers were bought in the Dominion for breeding purposes to restock dairy herds in the United Kingdom depleted during the war.

Included in the 150 pedigree cattle is a special heifer purchased from the Carnation Milk Farms at Seattle, Wash., valued at \$2,000. Another is the daughter of "Sovereign," a famous Ontario purebred, worth \$1,500.

During the past twenty-five years, Mr. Murphy has shipped cattle to nearly every part of the world, including Chile, Puerto Rico, Argen-

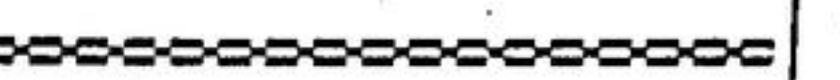

FARMERS CAN AVOID \$13-MILLION LOSS

Smut disease of grain crops causes a loss of about 13 million dollars a year to Canadian farmers, Dr. W. C. Broadfoot, Division of Botany and Plant Pathology, Dominion Department of Agriculture told the annual convention of the Canadian Seed Growers' Association. The speed with which this disease spreads is shown by the fact that when two per cent of the heads in a field contained stinking smut, 22 per cent of the threshed grain was contaminated; and when 8 to 16 per cent of the heads in the field were smutty, over 80 per cent of the threshed grain graded

smutty. There is no need to continue suffering losses from smut. Of the seven different smuts of cereals said Dr. Broadfoot, five can be controlled by disinfecting the surface of the seed with the appropriate organic mercury fungicide such as Ceresan. The remaining two smuts—loose smut of wheat and loose smut of barley, require the more exacting hot water treatment
