MANY ACCIDENTS ON FARM YOUTH KILLED UNDER BARN
It is amazing the number of accidents in one season arising out of farming, operating machinery on the farm, or working around barns. Just last week in Egremont township in the Walkerton district one of these sad occurrences happened that cost a young man his life.
Kinross Marshall, 23-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Marshall of 2nd con. of Normanby at Knox corners was instantly killed on the farm of Clarence Caldwell, near Dromore, in Egremont township. The young man was working in the company of Earl Matthews, Coldwin Wilson and Clarence Caldwell, putting a sleeper under Caldwell's stable, when the beam slipped, striking Marshall on the head and fracturing his skull. He died instantly. Coroner Dr. H. B. Jamieson was called and pronounced death accidental.

Steals Three Trucks In Few Hours

In the early hours, he is alleged to have stolen three trucks belonging to Curran and Briggs, Construction Company, Pickering. The first truck was found stalled on the new highway, one and a half miles east of Dumbarton. His second effort was with a ten-wheel Aero truck, which he stalled on the Brock road hill, and finally he was successful in taking a dump truck. Following his arrest, he took Pickering Police officers to where he had hidden the third truck.
Chase has been lodged in the Ontario County jail, to await a hearing.

HOLT COUPLE TRY COURT ACTION
