part is that of two stallions fighting for the leadership of a band of wild horses. With manes tossing, the horses are locked in mortal combat. She has caught the one stallion with a slight advantage over the other, leaving little doubt as to which one will be victorious.

Mrs. Leat uses blocks of hard birch, butternut, walnut and almost any wood imaginable. She owns one carving made from a piece of what is called "purple heart." The tree found in Africa, turns a purple shade 24 hours after the wood has been laid bare.

Although she started only three years ago, she possesses over 100 carvings that took an average of 90 hours apiece to complete.

During the winter time she says, she spends 10 hours a day at her hobby, "We can't get her to bed," commented her husband.

All the poses are original. Mrs. Leat said she often wakes up in the middle of the night with an idea. Instead of waiting until morning, she gets a pencil and makes a sketch.

Her idea then is resketched on a piece of wood, sometimes two feet square, and her task is begun.

She would not part with any of her carvings, but said she might have to in the future. "We are getting so many of them I don't know where we will put them," she explained.

Another who has never had a lesson, but turns out striking figures in wood is the Markham post mistress, Mrs. Lola Palmer, who started her hobby a year ago.

Although her spare time is limited, she has several beautiful carvings of wild animals and horses. Mrs. Palmer first started her work with a pen-knife, but since then has acquired orthodox carving tools.

On her walls hang paintings of all sorts, but like Mrs. Leat, she has abandoned her painting for carving. She took up carving after seeing some figures in a downtown department store, "I didn't think I could do it, but now I can't get enough of it," she laughed.
