## Member of Prominent Family A. Miller Dead

Andrew Miller, member of the prominent pioneer family of Pickering, and known throughout Canada and in the United States as a breeder of high-class Shorthorn cattle, died suddenly at his home early Monday morning, following a stroke. He was in his 73rd year.

Deceased was a son of the late J. Miller, born on the 7th concession of Pickering Township. The late Andrew Miller farmed on the 7th for forty years before retiring to Claremont. His fame as a breeder of high-class Shorthorn cattle was known throughout Canada and in the United States. Unlike his late father who was prominent in the municipal life of the township, and was a former Ontario County Warden, he was a quiet unassuming man whose entire interest centred in his life as an agriculturist and stock-raiser.

He was identified with the Presbyterian church and of late years with the United Church.

Surviving is a sister, Mary, with whom he made his home in Claremont and a brother John Miller at Brougham. John Miller at Ashburn who is a renowned cattleman is a nephew.

The funeral on Wednesday afternoon was conducted from the late home by Rev. I. E. Kennedy. Interment was made in Claremont Union Cemetery.

Following his marriage to the former, Minnie Yake, the couple farmed for 26 years in Scott Township, for five years in Uxbridge, and came to their present home on the 5th concession a little over a year ago.

Deceased was a member of the Presbyterian Church at Quaker Hill and was an usher and a member of the Official Board.

Trees were downed on the neighboring farms of Walter Ward and the Misses Graham and some grain was flattened.

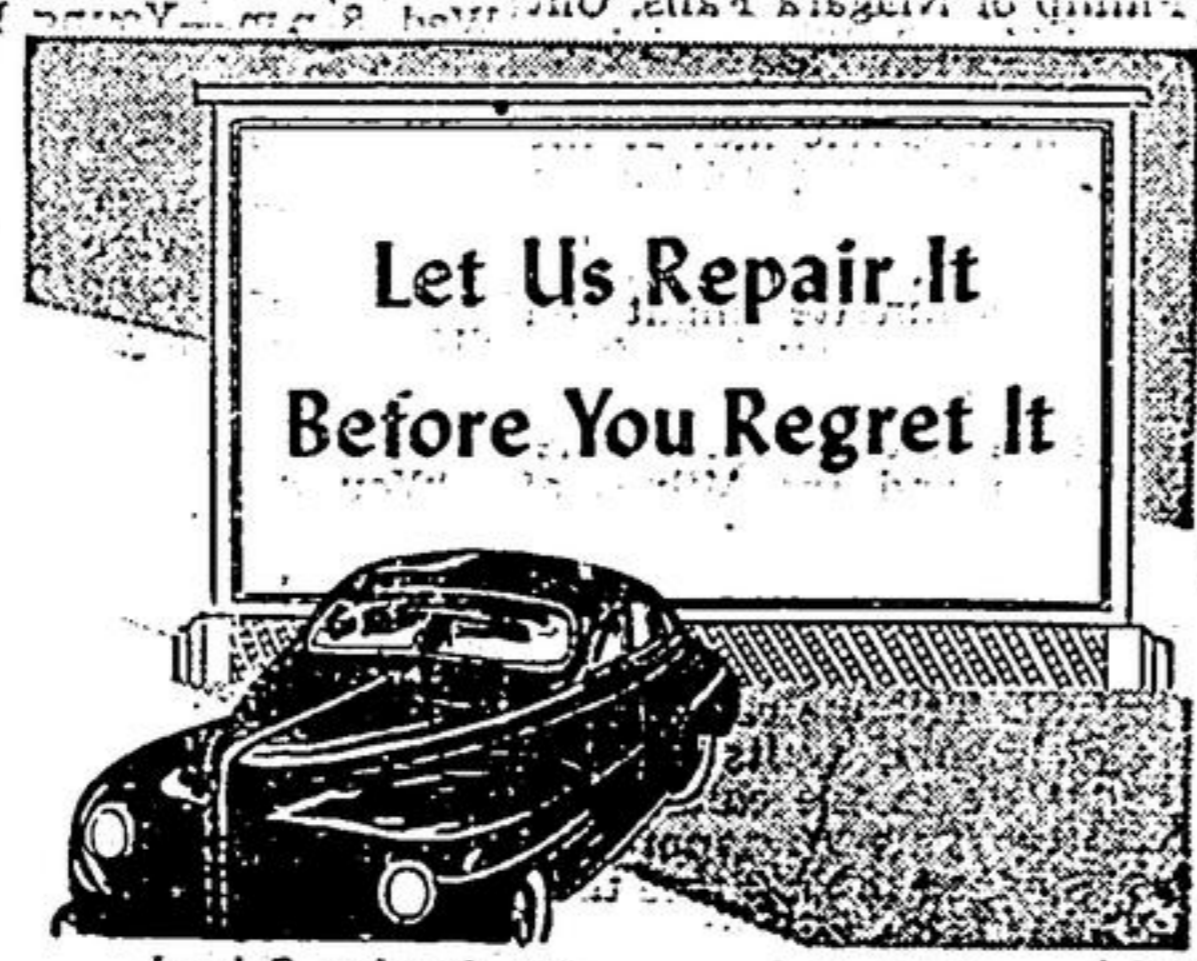
