Juniors Nose Out Newmarket 4-2 in Thrill-packed Game

It was a thriller from start to finish—Stouffville nosed out Newmarket 4-2 on Wednesday night in the best played junior ball game played in the park this year. Up until the last innings both teams played almost errorless ball. There were a few solid pokes into the field in the first six innings, but with the exception of one bad throw on each side, the ball was faultlessly handled.

Lorne Schell on the Stouffville mound turned in a superb piece of pitching, and held the visitors to three scattered hits. In addition he set down eight Newmarket batters via the strikeout route. Dales on the opposing hill was equally good and struck out seven hometown batsmen.

Schell pitched himself out of danger on two occasions, in the first innings when the initial batter tripled, and in the second after Newmarket's second and third hit by Dales and Hopper, the runners were nipped out at third and at home plate.

Stouffville failed to get a man to first until the fifth innings when Ken Schell made it on an error. The game was held up in the second innings when umpire Bob

Snowball behind the plate ruled both Newmarket runners out, one at third and the other at home. Newmarket, led by manager Geo. Hasket, protested vigorously but to no avail.

In the last innings Winger for Newmarket, walked. Dales and Hopper were struck out. Winger gaining second on a close decision. Ken Schell making a perfect toss to Minton covering. THIS KNOWLEDGE

Q.—How can I avoid spots from raindrops on new kid gloves?

A.—Do not allow the gloves to dry, but while still on the hand and damp, go over them gently with a damp cloth, and it will leave no spots.

Q.—How can I keep eggs fresh for a few weeks?

A.—They will keep fresh if they are immersed in boiling water for about one minute.

Q.—How can I make a good shampoo?

A.—Cut a bar of pure castile soap into small pieces. Pour enough boiling water on the soap to make a thick jelly. Beat until thickened. This will keep the hair and scalp absolutely clean and pure. Bottle for future use.

Q.—How can I keep boiled potatoes white?

A.—Soak the potatoes in cold water for two hours before boiling and they will be white when cooked.

Q.—How can I preserve brooms and keep them clean?

A.—By dipping them in hot salted water occasionally.

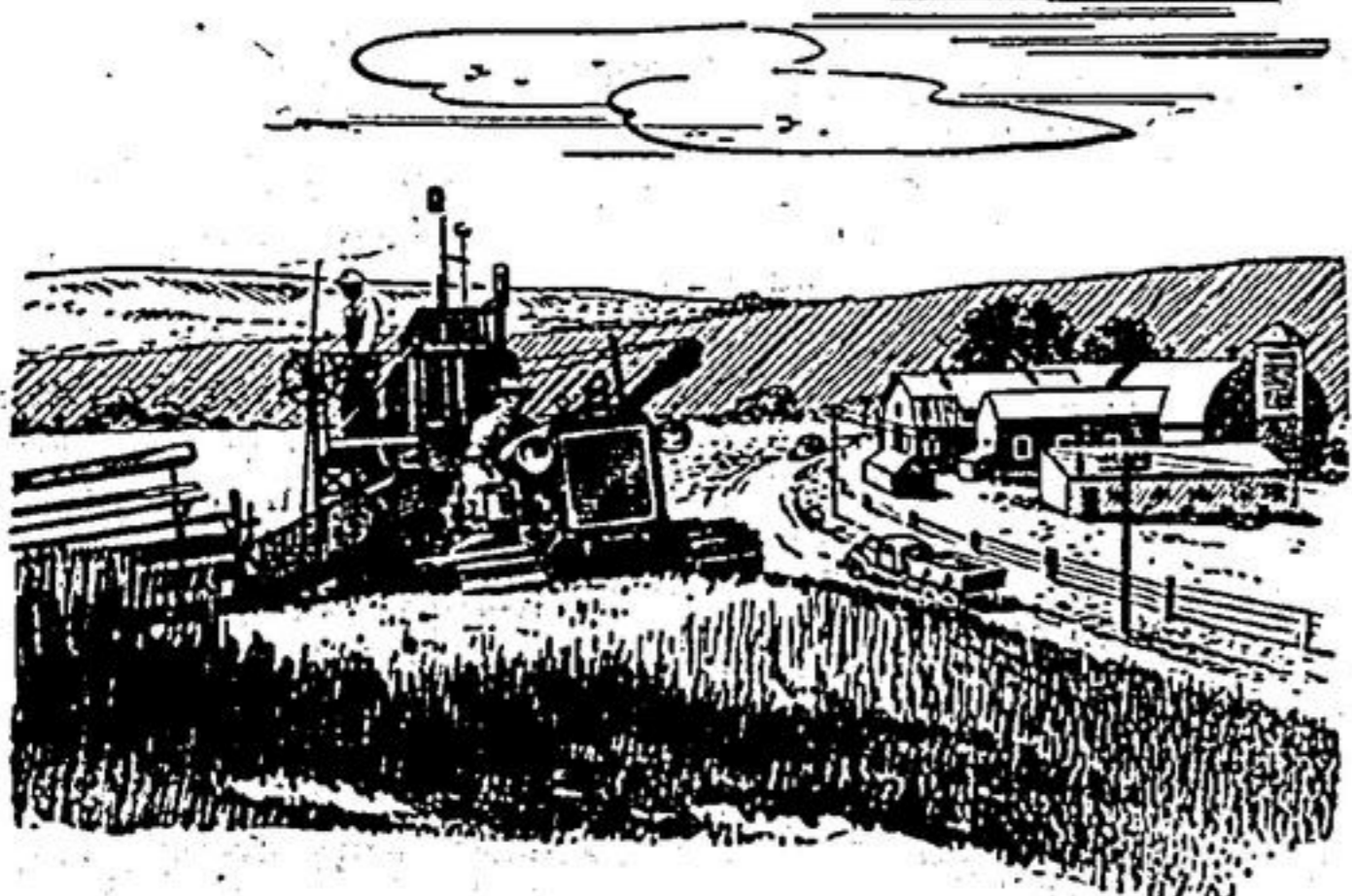

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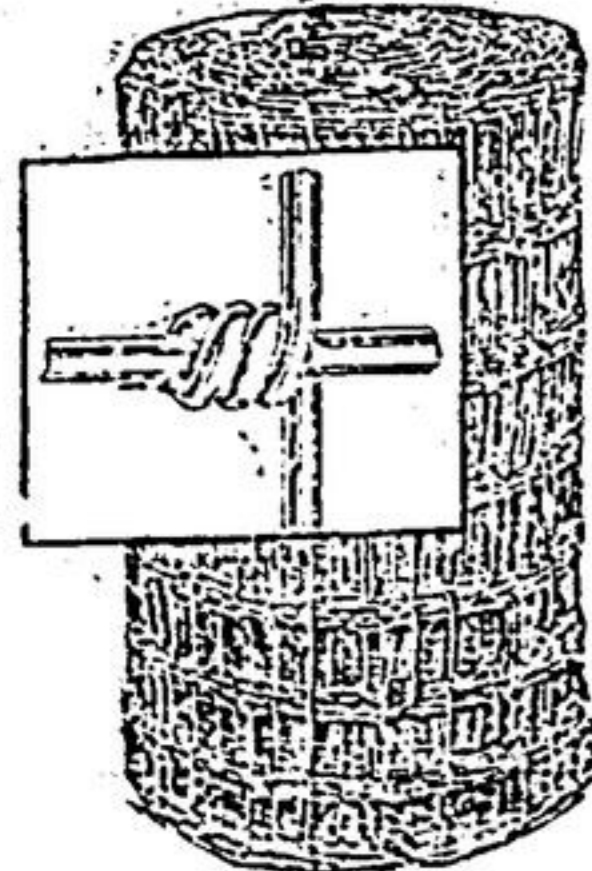

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- A.—Cream that has turned slightly may be sweetened and used for coffee without curdling, or tasting sour, if a small quantity of baking soda is added to it.

- Q.—How can I make a filler for



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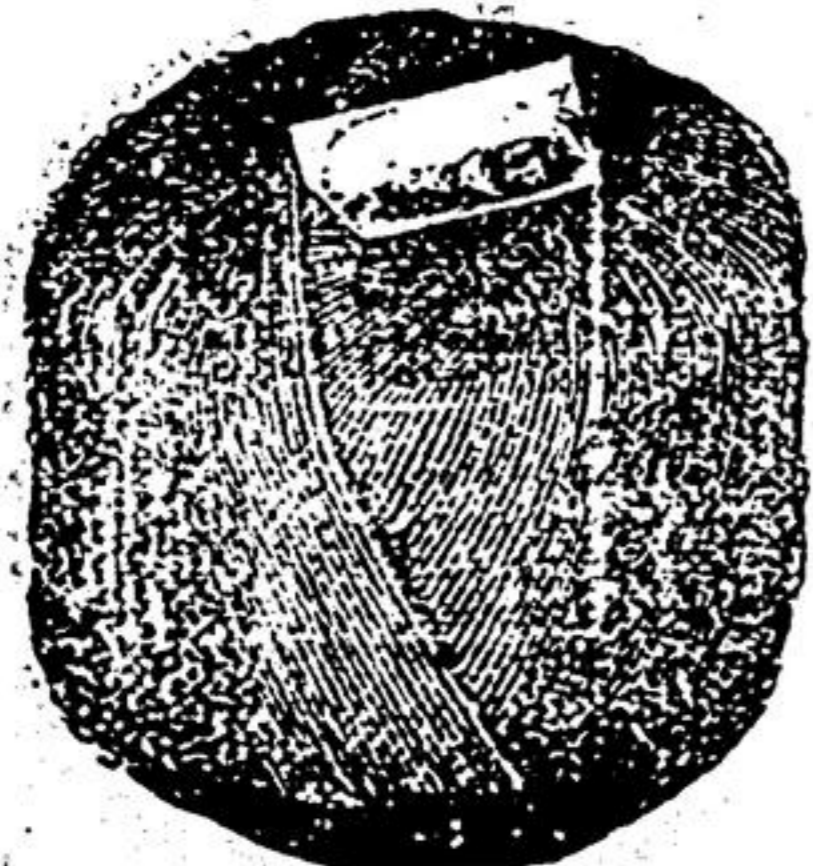


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
