FARMERS INSPECT LEITCH-CROFT HAY FIELDS AND TEST CROPS

The York County Crop Improvement Association held another of its informative held meetings on Friday evening at Leitchcroft Farm in Markham Township. Keen interest in Cornell 595 was shown by attendance of close to 250 with over 90 cars parked in the yard. At the hour set to start 109 were present and got their names in for the draw for two bushels of Cornell

which was won by Charles Ellis of Unionville.

The group visited fields of Dawson's Golden Chaff of which Leitchcroft has 70 acres and then examined the variety test plots which were explained by W. H. Waddell, winter wheat research specialist. Inspection of the nine-acre field of Cornell 595 and a discussion on the distribution of the seed from the twenty-seven fields of this crop to the farmers of the county as part of the program for Winter Wheat improvement was made.

During the evening farmers witnessed the new hay drier now in operation and showed a great deal of interest in this advancement.
