Noticing her mother was not with her, Lynn turned and darted back across the roadway. She ran into the left rear wheel of the truck.

Roads, Ditches, and Dust, Big Headache For Pickering Council

Endless complaints about road maintenance, ditching to be done, weeds to be sprayed and dust layer needed, all tended to make one grand headache for Pickering Township council, sitting in session on Tuesday afternoon.

The requests for grading and road repairs caused by flood waters all come from the lakeshore roads, some of them private roads. A petition of a dozen or more names was received from Mr. Walter Thompson regarding flooded conditions between lots 11 and 12 in the second con. Another lady claimed she got no police protection and that parts of her cottage were being removed, even to the entire front verandah.

There is a second maintainer on order for the township, but until its arrival the council's hands are somewhat tied in endeavoring to carry out all the jobs which they realize require attention. Some effort will be made to use the truck-drawn grader and to engage outside aid.

A resolution from council will be forwarded to the Woodbridge & Vaughan Telephone Co. complaining of the service being afforded at the Pickering Village central office.

Road accounts for the month totalled \$1369.27 and relief accounts \$407.07.

Two farmers were awarded a total of \$101.00 damages for sheep killed and injury by dogs. Hugh Miller of the 7th concession was paid \$87 for three lambs killed, a reg. ewe killed and one sheep injured. Milton Burk received \$14 for two purebred ewes killed.

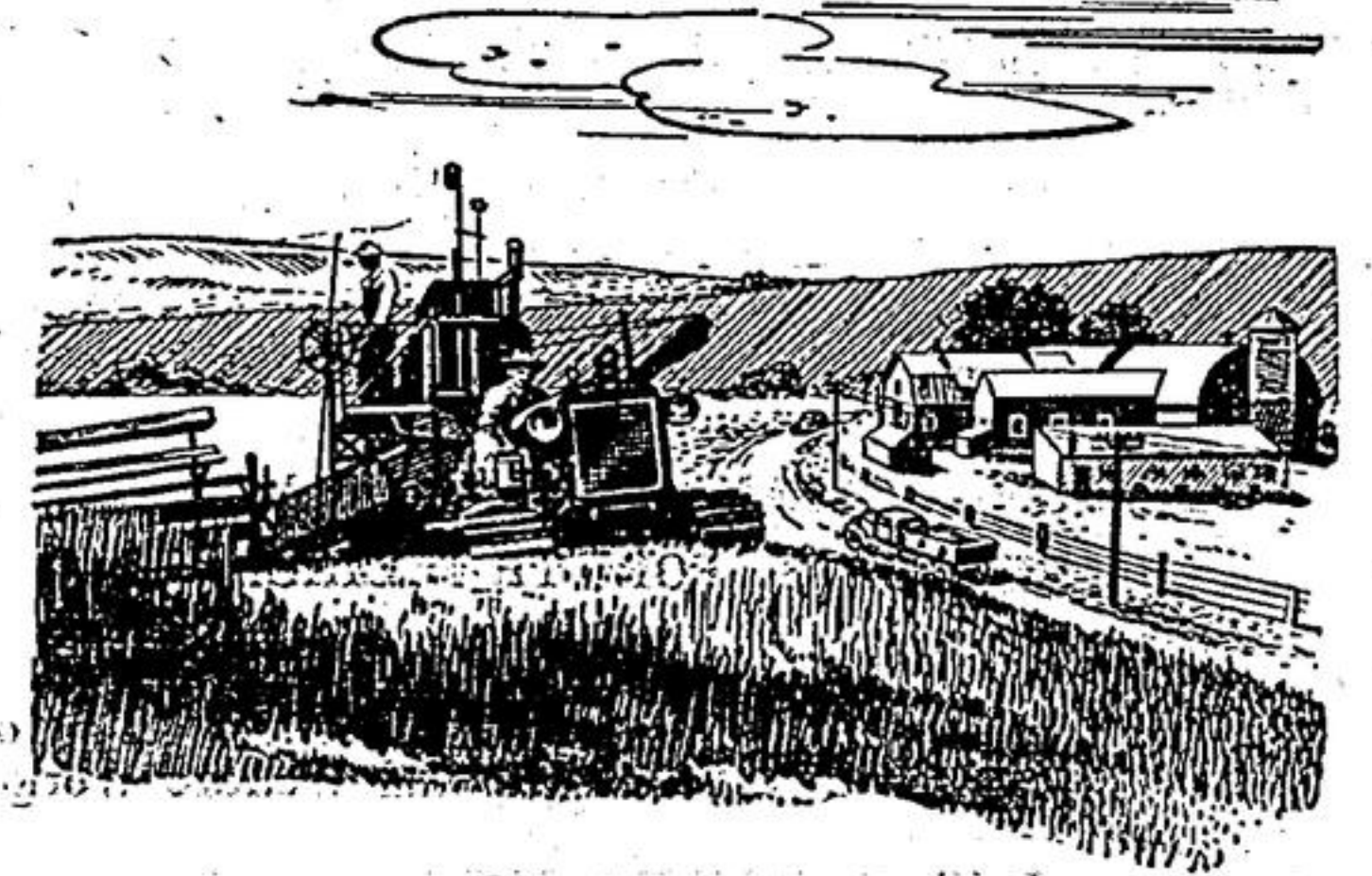

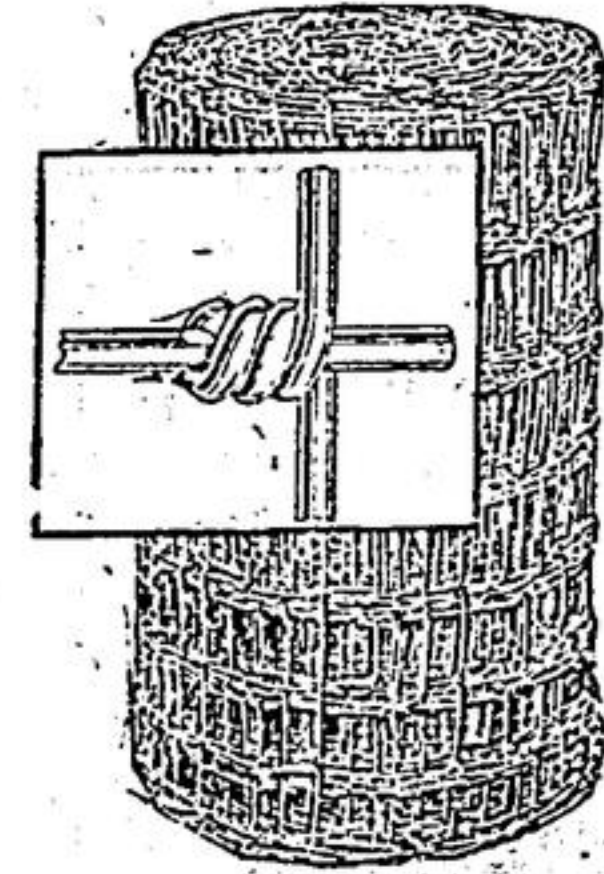
