NEW TYPE BALER BEATS PITCHFORK

Halifax, (CP)—The pitchfork has withstood for many years threats of modernization, but its position on the Nova Scotia farm is being challenged as a new type of baler moves into hay-fields.

The field baler is designed to harvest a crop in half the time required by old fashioned equipment. But like many mechanical developments it robs the countryside of one of its most picturesque sights—a field of hand-cocked hay. The baler eliminates the necessity of most of the hay-making process, including the need of endless days of sunshine for curing purposes.

However, it spares the farmer many of his "hay-making" worries, and much hard work. Often the hay can be taken in on the same day it is cut. It is pressed into 60 to 75 pound bales and then cross-stacked in the mow, allowing continuous circulation of air to carry away moisture.

Because of the more efficient drying process hay may be cut earlier when it contains more of the natural protein content. Better quality feed is obtained and more pasture is provided for midsummer and later.

The new equipment is tending to relieve urgency of farm labor problem for the new fortunate owners. One farmer near Truro counts on harvesting his crop in 20 days of fine weather instead of the 40 it used to require, and he will store it in one-third the barn space previously used.

TORONTO-BARRIE HIGHWAY WORK ON

Past highway construction records are taking a beating on the new Toronto-Barrie highway project near Aurora, Ont. where hard-hitting machinery is geared to an all time high. Contractor is Peacock & McQuigge, Ltd., of Toronto, who was awarded the contract by the Department of Highways of the Province of Ontario.

Boasting four lanes, the divided highway will consist of two 22-foot concrete strips, separated by a 30-foot boulevard with grades held to a maximum of three percent.

Terrin in the neighborhood of the giant project ranges from swampy bottom land to rolling hills, elevation with load maximum ascent of 82 feet, minimum ascent 72 feet.

300 Pheasants are Doubtful Attraction

Unless skunks or other animals have killed them, there are at least three hundred pheasants in the Township of Whitechurch, since the Department of Game and Fisheries deposited that many there just recently.

Henry Widdifield has had special pens made, where the birds may live for a few days or even weeks, while becoming accustomed to the surroundings. Gradually they are freed, but may come to the pens at night, until they get going completely on their own, and know how to protect themselves from natural enemies.

It is doubtful whether all the expense and trouble in trying to make Whitechurch, Markham, and other sections a hunting ground for pheasants is worth while. Many farmers do not approve of the scheme, and are not anxious to attract outside hunters to the municipality. They become a menace to peaceful country life, if too many are running about using fire arms with not too much care.

As one farmer asked the newspaper, "what benefits is it to attract a lot of city shooters into our township, making our lands a natural hunting ground for them to run over?"
