# Juniors Win Chamionship, Oust Newmarket in Rubber Game Played in Aurora

For the second successive year, Stouffville Junior ball team has ousted Newmarket from the O.B.A. playoffs in the third game of the final series. With the score tied 5-5 going into the last innings, Stouffville came through with three runs to clinch the group championship 8-5. Jewett came through with a double, Ken Schell and Carl Sellars, each singled to notch the three winning counters. Lanky Fred Sphilmann set down two of the last three Newmarket batters on strikeouts, and Blight for Newmarket who had given his supporters new hope by getting on by an error, died on third base when his team mates failed to come through with a hit.

It was a nip and tuck battle all the way, and the game was in doubt right up until the final out. Newmarket took the lead in the second innings 2-0, when Hopper and Thoms singled and Dales got on, by an error. Stouffville came right back in the top of the third to score four runs and send Newmarket pitcher Brown to the showers. Newmarket added another run to their total in the third, and then took the lead in the fifth 5-4. In the sixth, Ken Schell crossed the plate after a long fly was caught to even the score.

Rouse started the game on the mound for Stouffville, but was relieved after the third innings by Sphilmann. Hitting was spread throughout the local team, with no player getting more than one safety. Hopper was the most potent batter for Newmarket, getting a single and a triple in three trips to the plate.

Feelings were tense through the entire game, and was evidenced by a number of errors in the field. It will be recalled that last year after successive protests and counter protests, Stouffville defeated Newmarket on the same Aurora diamond for the championship. Again this year, the first game was thrown out due to a dispute, and again Stouffville came through to squeeze the Newmarketers from the running.

## Stouffville's One Big Innings Too Much for Newmarket Juniors

The second game of the two-out-of-three O.B.A. playoff between Stouffville and Newmarket Juniors ran true to form in Pantry Park on Friday night. Newmarket suffered one bad innings, in which Stouffville batters slammed pitcher Hopper around plenty, scoring six runs, enough to win the game.

The big innings was the very first one and the local lineup batted right around, Jewett, Rouse, Sellars and Sphilmann banged out a single, two doubles and a triple, and were aided by three field errors by Newmarket.

Freddie Sphilmann went the seven innings on the mound for Stouffville and gave up six hits, striking out four. Sphilmann was in trouble on numerous occasions and seven men were left stranded on the bases. Stouffville's fielding support was poor although they came through with two double plays which drew a big hand from the crowd. The one play was a line drive to Sphilmann who doubled the runner off second by tossing to Minton. The other twin play was Minton to Miller, and Miller to Jewett on third.

"Red" Palmateer went in as a pinch-hitter for Newmarket in the fifth innings when the bases were loaded, but Sphilmann disposed of the threat via the strikeout route.

Miller got his third homer of the season in Newmarket, driving a high one well out of the park in the second innings. There was no one on bases at the time, but the four-base clout increased Stouffville's total to seven runs.

Only three men faced Sphilmann in the last of the seventh, two being fielded out, and one struck out to end the game 8-4.

## Juniors Go Down 8-5 In First Official Playoff Game

Stouffville went down 8-5 before over three hundred fans, in the first official playoff game with Newmarket here on Wednesday night. The first game played in Newmarket the week previous was thrown out by the O.B.A. officials. Stouffville led 5-4 going into the sixth innings, when Newmarket bats cracked out a double and a single, which coupled with three errors gave the visitors four runs, enough to win. Pitcher Dales on the Newmarket mound turned in one of his best efforts and only seven Stouffville men faced him in the last two innings, four of these being set down on strikeouts. Sphilmann relieved Lorne Schell on the hill for Stouffville in the sixth, and

struck out three batters in the one and a half innings in which he pitched.

The home team got off to a bad start in the very first innings, Newmarket pushing across three runs to Stouffville's one. However pitcher Brown was hard hit in the second innings. Posenko, Campbell and Wilson touched him up for a double and two triples in that order, and coupled with two walks tied up the game at four-all.

Nick Posenko made himself a hero in the third and fourth. In the third, Nick was preparing to steal home on Dales' windup, a similar stunt to that which he pulled in the first game at Newmarket. However, Dales balked on the pitch, and Posenko was waved in by umpire Dyer behind the plate. This run gave Stouffville a 5-4 edge. In the fourth innings, Blight tagged a ball on a line for centre field, which was good for three hundred feet. Posenko ran some distance and leapt into the air to spear the drive. The play brought a big ovation from both sides.

Stouffville batters were definitely off the beam after Dales took over control and managed to get but two hits in four innings, seven going down on strikeouts. Six errors by the local nine proved a costly total. Newmarket committed only three boners.
