Announce Season for Pheasants, Partridge

Dates for Ontario and York Counties Oct. 31, Nov. 1 for Pheasants

Open season for "partridge" will run from Oct. 11 to Oct. 15, inclusive, in northern sections of Ontario where these birds may be hunted, according to an announcement from Hon. H. R. Scott, Minister of Lands and Forests.

Under the grouping come ruffed grouse, spruce partridge, sharp-tailed grouse, and ptarmigan. A hunter may shoot or have in possession five in any one day, or 20 in the season. They may not be hunted in Southern Ontario, except in Puslinch, Pickering, Whitby, and East Whitby townships.

Open days for pheasant are Oct. 31 and Nov. 1 in many Southern Ontario areas.

Pheasants may be taken on Oct. 31 and Nov. 1 in Haldimand, Halton, Kent, Lambton, Lincoln, Peel, Wellington and Wentworth Counties, and in Essex County, except Palee Township; also Burford, South Dumfries, Onandonga Townships, in Brant County, Aldborough, Bayham, South Dorchester, Dunwick and Malahide, in Elgin; Ekfrid, Metcalf, Mosa and Westminster, in Middlesex; Middleton, Townsend, Wingham and Woodhouse, in Norfolk; Pickering, Whitby, East Whitby, in Ontario; Blenheim, Durham, North Norwich, East and West Oxford, in Oxford County; South Marysburg, in Prince Edward County; Wilmot, in Waterloo; Puslinch, in Wellington, and North Gwillimbury, King, Markham, Vaughan and Whitchurch, in York County.

Limits are three cock birds killed or in possession on any one day, except in Pelee, where the total bag for both days may be eight cock birds.

Black and grey squirrels may be taken anywhere on Nov. 14 and 15, if the daily bag doesn't exceed five.
