Gormley M.B.C. Church Reports Good Year

Since becoming pastor of the Gormley circuit of the Mennonite Church a few short years ago, Rev. F. Huson has seen the financial strength of the church steadily going upward. Collections have increased \$3,455, with an increase in offerings this year alone of over \$473. There were 123 persons knelt at the altar, it was reported, at the annual meeting last Friday evening held in the Gormley church.

Foreign missions received \$1208, and \$600 for home missions last year, plus \$142 from the Sunday School for missions and \$130 from the W.M.S. The Young Peoples' Society raised \$463, and the Sunday School \$153. The pastor's stipend of \$1500 was raised and \$275 for the retiring ministers' fund. Other amounts were raised as well. Total monies raised were over \$8000.

Five members were baptized during the year, 8 received into the church, while 7 were dropped from membership or withdrawn. The membership stands at 165.
