Wesley Hardy Buried at Claremont

Well and favorably known to many people in Pickering Township, Wesley Hardy died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Edgar Slack, Reach Township, on Monday, September 8th, 1947, in his 78th year. The funeral took place on Wednesday, September 10th, 1947, to Claremont Union Cemetery, services being conducted by Rev. B. A. Sutton in Uxbridge Free Methodist church.

The late Wesley Hardy was born in Uxbridge township near Claremont in 1869, a son of the late William Hardy and Sarah Hopkins, and married Charlotte Redshaw in 1894. She predeceased him. For many years they farmed in Uxbridge township, until the death of his wife in 1942, after which he retired. About ten days ago he suffered a stroke while at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Edgar Slack, from which he failed to rally.

Left to mourn his death are three sons, William of Uxbridge, Norman of Tilsonburg, Lorne of Dunbarton and two daughters (Elizabeth), Mrs. Edgar Slack, Reach and (Ida), Mrs. Edward Thorn, Toronto; also two brothers, Charles and Walter, of Claremont.

Shovel Operator Has Narrow Escape when Bank Caves In

Pickering, Sept. 13 — Mervyn Gould narrowly escaped death last week, when the steam shovel, he was operating at a contract at Forest Hill, overturned when the bank he was digging into caved in. It took men two hours to dig him out. He was rushed to the Toronto Western Hospital, suffering a broken leg and a paralyzed arm. Gould could have escaped the accident, by dumping the load in the shovel, but by doing this he would have endangered the lives of three men, working below him, so took the chance himself. His condition was reported to be favourable yesterday.
