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Hunters use 22 Rifle on Wolf Pack, but no Kill

Mayor J. A. Barry of Renfrew had a thrilling experience the other day that provides general interest when he encountered a pack of bears, Mayor Barry and William Allum, both of Renfrew came upon a pack of timber wolves while in the bush.

After examining Mayor Barry's hunting camp near the Blackdonald River, the two men decided to stroll along the water, through the thick underbush where only a narrow path marked the way.

Hearing a loud cry, like an animal in distress, they explored its source to find a large pack of snarling wolves attacking a red steer in the shallow water of the river. As they neared the battle one huge wolf stood in their path. Mayor Barry fired after quickly loading his 22 rifle; the beast rolled over once and disappeared. Suddenly another wolf confronted them, and Mr. Allum, his 22 already loaded fired and hit the wolf. The bullet however was too light to more than wound the animal. It fled.

With departing cries and howls the wolf pack made off, the steer was still breathing, its loin torn away, and its back quarters partly eaten. It died shortly after. The steer was one of a herd of 50 pasturing in that vicinity.

SELDOM SEEN

Thrashing may be stream-lined today, but those of us who went to thrashing 25 years ago will never forget the meals served at thrashing time. The baker didn't call them, and the farmer's wife baked her own, which certainly had a flavour unknown in other bread.

The thrashing dinner was the high spot in every year of operations on the farm.

The old dinner bell clangs on the back of the kitchen. The machine toots and settles off with the belts coming to a slow, slapping stop and the machine idling down and suddenly stopping. The men come down out of the mows. The feeder jumps down from his platform, the separator man emerges from the dust carrying his long oil can. Uncle George comes out of the granary and says, "Well, come on boys I guess we'll see if there's anything to eat."

On a bench under the maple tree at the back door there will be a row of washbasins with a cake of soap beside each one and towels neatly stacked up. Hats are tossed off and there is a great splashing of water. The white towels are soon stained.

The farmer's wife appears at the side door, her ample frame covered by a clean, starched gingham dress with a clean "pinny" as she persists in calling her aprons. "Come in here men. I think it will be cooler than the kitchen."

The great table for twelve or thirteen men is spread in what she calls the back sitting room. She's had the doors closed and the blinds drawn all day and when you go in it does feel cool and refreshing. Something to be appreciated after standing in a dusty mow for several hours. The men slip into the chairs. Jim O'Leary blesses himself. Sandy Macpherson bows his head for a grace. A lot of the men just start reaching because the food is on the table.

There are great plates of sliced meat, fried, home cured ham; cold sliced roast beef; platters of ripe, red sliced tomatoes; stack of home made bread. The farmer's wife (its different now) wouldn't think of giving the thrashers baker's bread; and fresh buns, still hot from the oven; mounds of white mealy potatoes; pickles that almost break when you bite into them; fresh cream and butter brought in from the cellar; and the tea cup seems to refill itself because Aunt Martha and a couple of the neighbor women just hover over that table.

Men don't talk at a thrashing table, just nod or grunt for something to be passed, the fresh corn on the cob, the buttered beets or green peas, and then comes the dessert, apple and berry pies cut in four pieces, fresh chocolate cake and the perennial dish of preserves, and the men eat rapidly and well and then get up and go out to sit on the lawn beside the house and smoke, content and happy because they've just had a masterpiece of a dinner by the housewife on the farm. And what made it so good? One main reason was that everything was home made, bread, buns, pickles, pies, etc. Thank goodness there are still many good cooks left on the farms, but too many of them do not practice the art today.

NON-PROFIT HEALTH CARE TO BE GIVEN AT MINIMUM COST

Toronto, Sept. 16—A prepaid medical care plan for Ontario residents has been issued a charter and is expected to go into operation about November 1.

The announcement said the non-profit health organization is intended to bring the benefits of advanced medical care to the people of Ontario on a group insurance basis. It will be open to residents in all parts of the province.

Dr. W. Magner, President-elect of the Canadian Medical Association said in an interview at Timmins that the new prepaid plan for Ontario residents announced in Toronto likely will enrol some 2,000,000 persons within the next three months.

"It will undoubtedly be the most advanced prepaid medical scheme in the world," he added.

Charter Granted
The charter granted by the Ontario Government provides that the medical care organization will be directed by nine members of a board of governors, three of whom may be laymen. All members of the first board are physicians and will serve for nine months, beginning September 1. Thereafter elections will be held annually.

Dr. Melville C. Watson of Toronto is Chairman of the present board, on which all sections of the province are represented. The other members are Dr. F. Brockschire, Windsor, Dr. A. F. Dunn, Ottawa; Dr. Milne Harvey, Kitchener; Dr. Maurice Kelly, Timmins; Dr. H. D. Logan, Lindsay; Dr. A. D. Pollock, Owen Sound, Dr. Lorne Whittaker, St. Catharines; and Dr. John Oille, Toronto.

It is intended that the health organization work in close co-operation with the Plan for Hospital Care, which also was started on a group insurance plan and has enrolled about 800,000 members.

To Name Manager
A general manager has yet to be appointed for the project.

"Costs will be as low as we can make them," an official said today. "Our ultimate object is to give complete medical and surgical care at the lowest minimum cost."

The Ontario Medical Association at its May meeting endorsed by more than 40 to one in a standing vote a proposal that it sponsor a plan of prepaid medical care.

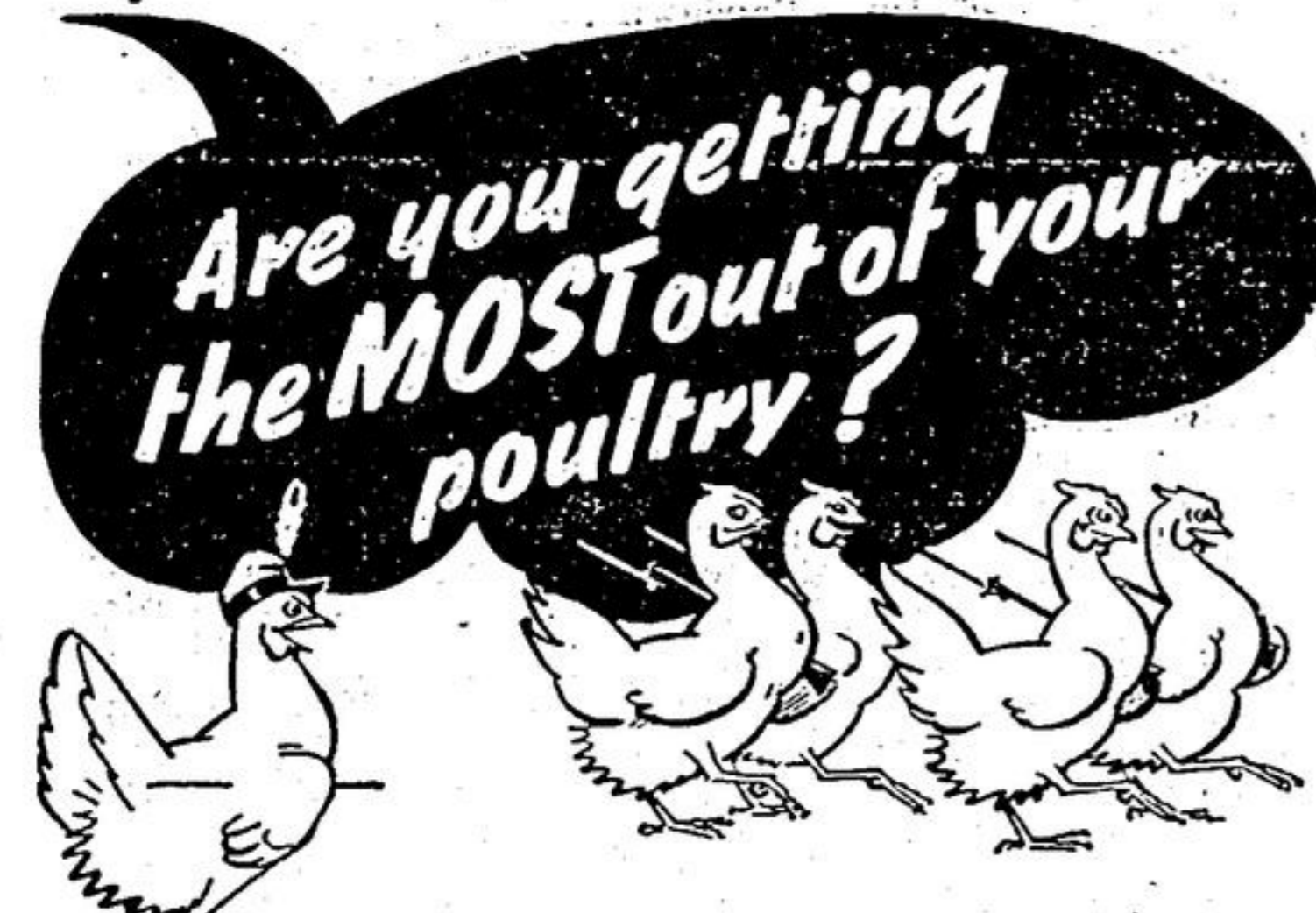

Protect Motorist From All Claims In Accident Cases

Automobile insurance companies are liable for claims filed by an injured passenger against a private motorist in Ontario, even though their policies say the companies are not liable. Mr. Justice A. M. LeBel ruled last week in a written judgment.

For 12 years Ontario private motorists have been unable to buy insurance to protect them against claims by passengers injured in this province. Mr. Justice LeBel ordered the

Ocean Accident and Guarantee Corporation to pay Theresa Harrison, Toronto nurse, \$5,000 damages, plus interest at five per cent from Dec. 19, 1944, for injuries she suffered while a passenger in a car owned by the late Albert E. Krug. Krug was killed at the time Miss Harrison, his nurse, was injured. She obtained judgment of \$7,500 against his estate but the money was not paid, the Court was told.
