SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Lesson for October 12
Golden Text.—Wherefore he is able to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by him.—Heb. 7:25
The Lesson as a Whole
 We saw in last week's lesson that in Hebrews we have the "better" things of the new dispensation contrasted with the lesser things of the old. This is emphasized further for us in the passages selected for our present consideration, where we are occupied with our blessed Lord as the minister of the heavenly sanctuary, exercising a better priesthood (Heb. 7:15, 16) than that of Aaron, which has now passed away and with this there has been made a change of the Law (chap. 7:12). Christ has, by His one offering on the cross, obtained eternal redemption for all who believe the Gospel (chap. 9:12).

This work of redemption was finished upon the cross. The ministry of intercession has been carried on ever since our Lord returned to the Father. He bears up before God all His own, even as the high priest of old bore the names of all Israel on his heart (Exod. 28:9-12) when he went into the holy place to offer the pure incense, which speaks of prayer (Psa. 141:2). This intercessory work is for the purpose of maintaining and sustaining His people in their testimony for God, as they pass through this adverse scene, in which they are "strangers and pilgrims" (1 Pet. 2:11). It is precious to realize that He ever prays for even the feeblest of His saints, and enters into all their trials and sorrows as they journey on to the Home above.

There has never appeared on earth another who so thoroughly entered into all human distresses and understood all the perplexities that trouble the minds of men, as the Lord Jesus Christ. None else could fathom the depths of human hearts as He, who was God and man in one blessed, adorable person. He did not need to study men. He knew them intuitively. He knew their thoughts and anticipated all their problems. And so today He remains the one unchanging Christ, who can minister to men in every circumstance. He binds up broken hearts, heals sin-sick souls, and meets every demand of the most exacting searcher after ultimate truth. He is Himself "the way, the truth, and the life" (John 14:6). Men speak sometimes of "the problem of Jesus." He is not a problem. He is the solution to every problem. Verse by Verse.

Heb. 4:14.—"A great high priest, that is passed into the heavens." Just as Aaron, of old, on the great day of atonement (Lev. 16) passed through the court of the Tabernacle, after he had offered the sin offering on the altar, and was soon hidden from the eyes of the people as he entered the sanctuary, which typified the heavenly places, so Christ, our great High Priest, has passed through the lower heavens into the Heaven of heavens, where He abides until the hour of His return.

And though awhile He be hid from the eyes of men, His people look to see Their great High Priest again. Therefore the importance of holding fast our confession (not merely profession) as we wait for Him to appear the second time (chap. 9:28).

Verse 15.—"We have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities." Our Lord, as man, passed through all such experiences as we are subject to, and "was in all points tempted," that is, through the

WHAT WILL ONTARIO DO ON MEAT STRIKE ILLEGALITY?

On the heels of the declaration by the conference of Provincial Labor Ministers in Toronto that the meat packing strike was illegal, Ontario was believed to be getting ready to follow up the finding in a showdown on labor's position in relation to the law.

The province's labor law provides that every employee who goes on strike illegally, is liable to a fine of not more than \$20 for each day he is on strike. At the same time, the union can be fined a maximum of \$200 a day.

If the Ontario strikers (2,800) alone and the union were convicted and fined for merely the time they have already been on strike, the courts would collect a total of well over \$300,000.

The magnitude and complications of the task of taking 2,800 strikers to court would seem to rule out any such action. The Federal Government was faced with the same problem during last year's steel strike which was just as illegal technically as the meat packing walk-out. At that time Ottawa decided it just wasn't physically possible to prosecute 11,000 strikers.

appeals to the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, without, or apart from sin. That is, He never was tempted by inbred sin, for He was from His birth the Holy One of God (Luke 1:35).

Verse 16.—"Let us therefore," knowing we have such a one representing us before God, "come boldly into the throne of grace," there to obtain when failure has come in, and to find all needed grace for reasonable help.

Chap. 7:26.—"Such an high priest became us." He is suitable for us because He is all that man should be, but is not naturally. Unstained by sin, He can give us a perfect representation before God, where He ever presents our needs and enters into our griefs.

Verse 27.—"Who needeth not daily.....to offer up sacrifice..... this he did once." It is once in the sense of finality: once for all. There is no requirement for another sacrifice for sins, because He has settled the sin question by His sacrificial death, having met every claim of the violated Law, on our behalf.

Chap. 9:23.—"The heavenly things" have been "purified" with "better sacrifices" than those under Law. There is no comparison between the value of the legal offerings and Christ's one offering upon the cross.

Verse 24.—"Christ is..... entered into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God for us." As minister of the heavenly sanctuary, Christ has entered into the holiest of all, into the immediate presence of God to make intercession for all who trust in Him.

Verse 25.—"Nor yet that he should offer himself often," as the sacrifices were offered under the Law of Moses. There, year after year, the high priest entered the holiest with other blood than his own, but Christ, by the shedding of His own blood, has effected propitiation for sins in a way that leaves nothing more to be done.

Verse 26.—"Once in the end of the world," that is, morally speaking, "hath he appeared to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself." Sin is no longer a barrier between God and man. Propitiation has been made. Now the question that is up between God and men is that of our attitude toward His Son. When we receive Him as our Saviour, all the value of His work is put down to our account.

Chap. 10:11.—"Every priest standeth..... offering oftentimes the same sacrifices." The priest of old had no provision made in the Tabernacle for sitting down, because their work was never done. All day long, one sacrifice followed another as men came with their offerings, "which can never take away sins." They merely typified the work of the Cross, where the sin question was to be settled for eternity, and thus never to be raised again.

Verse 12.—"This man..... sat down on the right hand of God." Having completed His propitiatory work, Jesus took His seat at God's right hand. His work was finished. There was nothing more to be done! In this faith rests and the conscience finds peace.

Verse 13.—"From henceforth expecting." He is waiting for the hour when all things are subdued to Himself at His second advent.

Verse 14.—"By one offering he hath perfected," not for a season, or so long as the believer is faithful, but "for ever all them that are sanctified," or set apart to God in all the value of the blood of His cross.

The Heart of the Lesson
 The offerings of the Old Covenant were but types of the redemptive work of Jesus. They could never put away sin because there was not sufficient intrinsic value in them. But the work of Christ on the cross has settled every claim God had against lost mankind and now all may be saved eternally if they will but trust in Him. Moreover, He who died to save as lives to keep us; so we are eternally secure as those who have been perfected forever before God by Christ's finished work.

If Ontario reaches the same conclusion, there seems to be little more than can be done in a legal fight. This is evident from the comment of Fred Dowling, union head, when he said: "We are amazed at the certification of unions which violate provincial labor laws. In the way the conference was conducted. The statement issued..... certainly does not contribute toward a solution....."

A late report had it that Ontario action might be the introduction of a special bill at the coming session of the legislature aimed at shortening the union activities complained of in the meat strike. A fine of \$2,000 a day for unions illegally on strike has been mentioned as the keystone of the proposed legislation.
