Winners in Calf and Grain Clubs

Achievement days for the Markham Boys' Calf and Grain Clubs held in conjunction with Markham Fair proved in both cases very interesting for boys, parents and friends. This was the culmination of an active summer's season for these boys ranging in age from 12 to 20 years, who only a week or so before completed their respective examinations and judging competitions.

Early in the afternoon the boys vied for their final marks on their calves and showmanship. M. C. McPhail, principal of the Kemptville Agricultural School and former Agricultural Representative in York County, placed the calves on conformation in their separate classes. Twenty boys competed for calf honours with Trevor Watson, Agincourt leading the Holstein group; Brownie Weir of Milliken, the Jerseys; Ray Ingleton of Agincourt, the Guernseys and George Tran of Markham, the Ayrshires. At the same time Mr. Roy Ormiston of Brooklin, Holstein fieldman, placed the boys for their showmanship ability and the top two boys, Jim McCowan and Ray Ingleton, received leather calf-halters donated by York County Holstein Club. Bill Clark and Trevor Watson tied for third place honours. The standing of the first two boys given below is the basis of a possible of 400 points for their calves and 600 for the boy's work throughout the summer including showmanship at the fair, answers to ten questions on club work, attendance at meetings, judging two classes of cattle, care of the calves, monthly reports, etc.:
