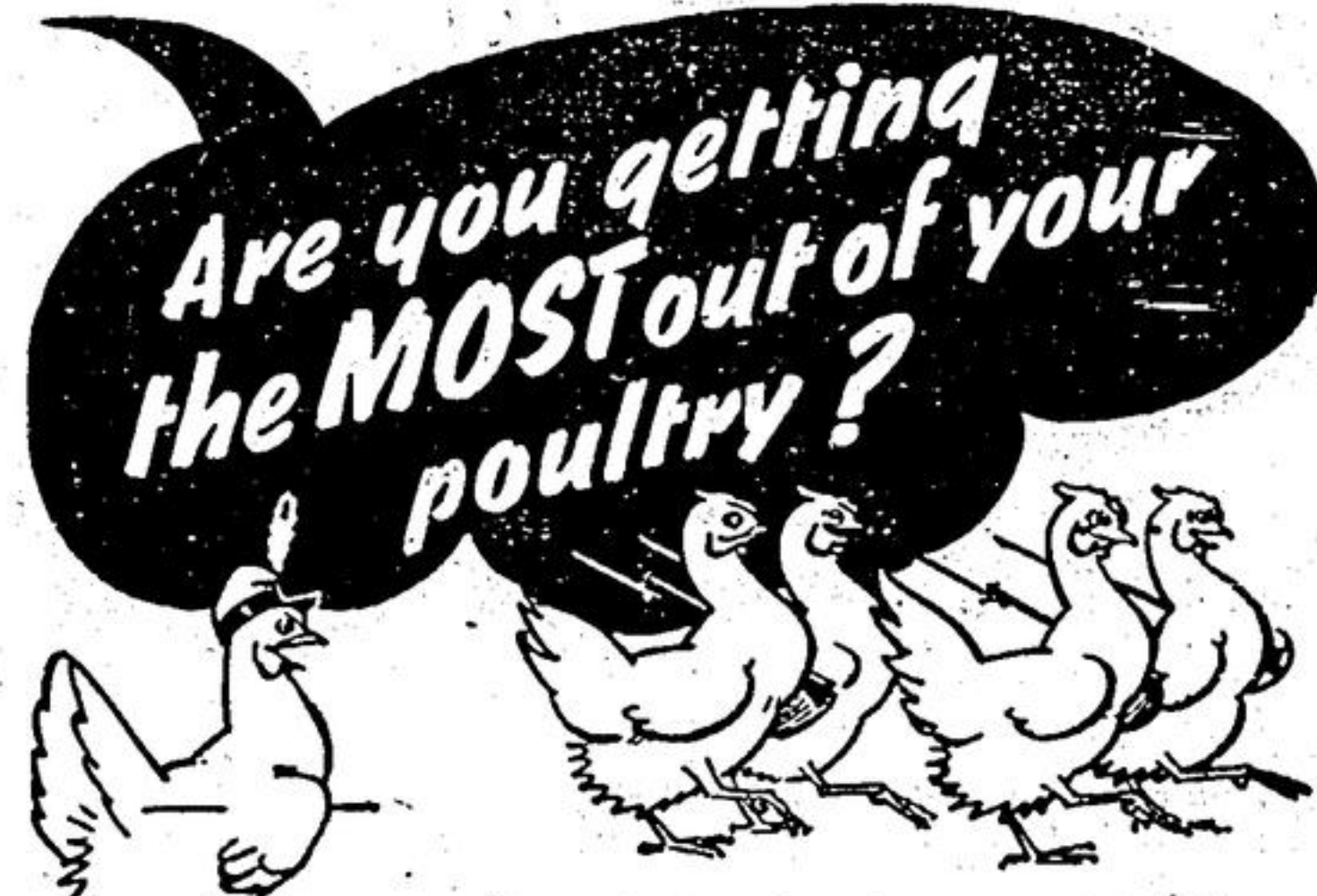

### SELDOM SEEN

Q.—How can I make gloves look like new after washing them?  
A.—When laundering gloves wash them in warm water and rinsing in tepid soapsuds, adding to the last rinsing water one tablespoon of glycerine. This method is also beneficial to the gloves.

Q.—How can I clean a slender vase satisfactorily?  
A.—Fasten a piece of old sponge on a stick and push down into the vase. This method is also very useful for cleaning decantors and water bottles.

Q.—How can I add a delicious flavor to my lemon pie?  
A.—Instead of using cornstarch or flour when making the meringue, try grating one potato for each pie. It adds a delicious flavor.

Q.—How can I keep the hands soft?  
A.—The hands will be softened and whitened if washed every night in corn meal, moistened with vinegar. Another treatment that is often effective is to rub the hands with buttermilk.

Q.—How can I remove paint stains from fabrics?  
A.—Try saturating two or three times with equal parts of ammonia and turpentine, then wash thoroughly in soap suds.

Q.—How can I retain the vivid and appetizing colors of new vegetable when cooking them?  
A.—A pinch of soda in the boiling water will help.

Q.—How can I remove that faded and worn look from the seams of carpets and rugs?  
A.—Try using paints or soft crayons of the same color as the rest of the rug, and touching up the worn places with these.

Q.—How can I remove coffee stains from table linen?  
A.—Glycerine will remove coffee stains from a linen tablecloth. Apply the glycerine and let stand for three or four hours, then wash the cloth.
