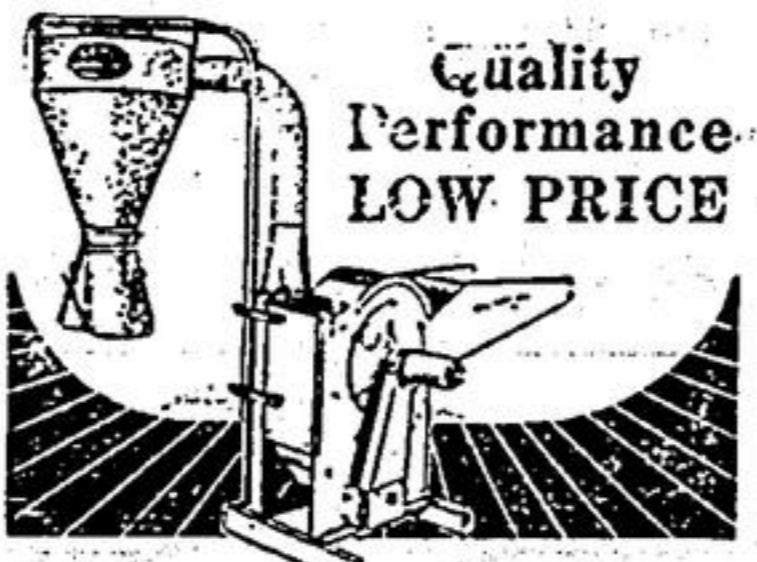
Resumes Medical Practice
